OSU Uses Computer As Weapon In World Weed Control Fight

The sophisticated computer has been recruited by researchers at Oregon State University to assist in the worldwide battle against the lowly weed.

The computerized weed data program is part of the International Plant Protection Center at OSU and the OSU Farm Crops Department's international weed control project.

An IPCC computer specialist is working closely with weed control specialists to translate field research into information that can be plugged into the automated system. All elements of field trials — soil, moisture, weather, crops, etc. — are carefully noted and made part of a permanent record.

The ultimate aim is to provide answers for growers, says Dr. William Furtick, director of the Plant Protection Center and a world authority on weed control.

What is the best method of weed control, for example, for a specific crop under a specific set of conditions? Is mechanical weed control better than using herbicides? If herbicides are best, which chemicals should be used in what combination and at what rates?

The computer helps provide the answers, Furtick points out. The package approach to agricultural production used in Western countries — combining insect and weed control measures along with high quality seed, fertilizers and irrigation — has been successful, he notes.

"But it also has created a need for more information on how to most effectively put all the elements together. The computerized weed control data system at OSU is an effort in this direction. It also should provide Oregon farmers with a chance to benefit from information collected all around the world," Furtick observes.

The OSU-IPCC program was featured in a recent edition of "War on Hunger," published by the U. S. Agency for International Development. Allen Deutsch, OSU-IPCC information specialist, wrote the special feature.

Insect Controls Are Not for Food Areas

Insects buzzing around or crawling over food in food stores, warehouses or processing plants are taboo under sanitation standards set by the Oregon Department of Agriculture.

But don't use Vapona strips or automatic time interval releasing insecticide dispensers to control insects in these places.

This warning is sounded by the Dairy and Consumer Services Division of the Oregon Department of Agriculture, which is assigned most of the department's activities directed at assuring the consumer a pure food supply.

In warning against use of these devices in control of insects, Joe Gray, assistant administrator of the division for foods, reminds that the Federal Food and Drug Administration also prohibits their use in areas where food is on display, stored, prepared or served. It also requires that labels warn against their "use in kitchens, restaurants or areas where food is prepared, displayed or served."

During 1970 the FDA denied petitions requesting tolerances be set on Vapona strips and the automatic time interval releasing dispensers. Denials were on the grounds that they added residue of pesticide chemicals to exposed foods and such residues

would vary widely from non-detectable to one part per million or above, depending on the type and form of food, the ventilation of the area and location of the food with respect to the dispenser and the length of time the food was exposed.

Gray's advice to those having insect problems is to start solving them by destroying the breeding places, then if added control is needed use some of the approved insecticides on the market and while applying them completely cover all food and surfaces with which food will come in contact.

Other precautions also need to be taken with all pesticides and hazardous materials to keep them from contaminating food and one don't to always remember is "don't store them over or near food."
