The State awards will be presented at the State Convention in Portland in late June.

IRRIGON—Judge Paul Jones of Heppner and Morrow County Commissioner Walter Hayes of Boardman, met with City Council members, March 18, to discuss formation of a Morrow County Coordinating Committee, to be comprised of a representative from each City within the County and of the County Court.

The purpose of such a committee is that approval for requests for Federal loans and grants will be retained on a local county basis instead of approval for such requests on a multi-county level as was required by the Council of Governments.
