

HHS Trackmen Place Fifth At County Invitational

Fifth place was the best the Mustangs could do at the Morrow County Invitational at Riverside on Saturday. The Broncos could only muster up one first place in the 'A' classification. Sherman High School led all other 'A' teams with 84 points, the Huskies took first place in the 100, 220 and 2 mile. John F. Kennedy High School followed the Huskies with 52 1/2 tallies. Third place was taken by Condon with 72 points. McEwen grabbed 4th place with a total of 59 points. Heppner totaled 43 1/2 points. Other 'A' schools placing were Pilot Rock, 40, Umatilla 40, Arlington 35 1/2, Helix 20, Ione 12 1/2, and Echo 7. Rain accompanied the cindermen throughout the meet. Lane one was a muddy moat after the mile run—and got worse as the day progressed.

Lyle High School of Washington tallied the most team points in a four way meet at Wah-tonka Tuesday, 20th. Pilot Rock and Heppner also attended the meet. The Horsemen couldn't stand the pace that Lyle set on the extremely windy day—as a result Heppner scored 70 1/2 points (17 out of first place) to take second place honors. The Broncos were followed by the host, Wah-tonka with 54, and Pilot Rock tallied 35 points.

State Speaker On Drug Problem

Sergeant Berg of the Criminal Division, Oregon State Patrol was the featured speaker at the last Community Drug Education Program. He said drugs in Eastern Oregon were not a major problem until 1966. In that year there were 12 arrests for narcotics and dangerous drugs. In 1970 there were 600. He said, "You can easily see why we are becoming concerned over the drug problem." This year the number of arrests is still increasing. In the first three months of 1971 there were 240 drug arrests. "Normally, the winter months are the slow ones," Berg said. So you can see that the drug problem in our own locality is still mushrooming. It is interesting to note that the greater number of arrests were adults, about 3 times as many as juveniles.

Nuclear Power Sanction Meet At Heppner High

The Associated Students of Heppner High held a nuclear power plant sanctioning hearing Tuesday evening. Dan Sweeney was moderator.

Volunteer testimony given was favorable for locating nuclear power plants in Morrow County. Making recorded statements at the hearing were Stan Addison, Heppner High chemistry teacher; Morrow County Judge Paul Jones; Gene Pierce, president of the Heppner-Morrow County Chamber of Commerce; Forrest Burkenbine, Heppner fire chief; Ken Turner, chairman of the Heppner Soil and Water Conservation District; Heppner Mayor Bill Collins; Morrow County Sheriff John Mollahan.

Plent as Safe as Dam

Testimony suggested there were no more hazards from a nuclear power plant than from power dams. Others said there is a great need for electric power and we are running out of dam sites. The benefits from irrigation from the coolant waters are great and far reaching, offering opportunities to our young people who now have few reasons to stay in the county as there are comparatively few jobs.

Others testified that one nuclear power plant would add nearly 200 millions of dollars in assessed valuation. Each plant will have some 60 employees plus their families. "It will turn

our desert into a garden spot", said Judge Jones.

Many Benefits Possible

Row crops and the multiple benefits such as recharging ground water supplies, benefits to wildlife, frost protection, greenhouse heating, large supplies of power and many new jobs will add much to the economy of the county. New developments such as the nuclear power plants would enable us to make good use of Columbia River water. A warning was sounded by Ken Turner to the effect that not having such a development leading to a broad-based economy would mean economic stagnation for Morrow County. Heppner Mayor Collins said he had faith in the scientists who say there is no harm from the nuclear plants. Sheriff John Molahan said ours is a non-polluting type agricultural economy and the clean and non-polluting nuclear power plants would be ideal for our environment.
