Two Heppner boys qualified to go to the State Track Meet at the District meet held in The Dalles Saturday. The weather was lousy, raining off and on and windy. Barney Marshall qualified in both Shotput and Discus. His first in Shotput, 44' 3" was below what he usually does. His 112 in the Discus which put him in second place was above his average.

Kevin Dick came in for a first place in the two-mile with a time of 16:24, which was 4 seconds slower than his best time this year.

The State Meet will be held this weekend at Pleasant Hill just outside of Eugene on the Willamette Pass Hwy. The boys with Coach Dean Naffigen, will leave for the valley Thursday.
