

# Trip to the Mill...

This clipping was apparently from a Heppner paper shortly after August 28, 1898 as that is the date of the marriage of Ada M. Jones and Ben Parker.

## Crowd of School Teachers Visit Friends at Parker's Mill.

"Some trust in chariots and some in horsemen, but we, when making a long drive at night, will take the road which is familiar, rather than try any near ways over an unknown road," was the unanimous decision of six of the teachers of the county and two of the high school students after having wandered over the rocky prairies and through the canyons somewhere between Heppner, Hardman and Parker's mill Saturday night of last week for about three hours. The party consisted of Misses Haldiger, Snell, Bailey, and Barber, and W. C. Howard, J. O. Balenger, teachers, and Louis Balenger and Miss Lillian McNay, of the high school. With several guns, a good supply of ammunition, a surplus of kodaks, and but not least, an abundance of fruit and lunch, at 5 o'clock Friday, the merry party started for Parker's mill. The upper bridge on Rhea Creek was out, and the trip must either be made by Hardman or seven miles shorter through Spring Hollow. The latter was chosen. Strange to say one of the many wrong roads was taken. All went well for a while but the road finally came to an end in a rock bed. With a lantern the road was found and after traveling some distance the party found that they were

traveling back over the same road over which they had just come. Facing about they found another way. This led down a canyon two or three miles and then back up another. And the party began to feel like "Bunyan's pilgrim in the Slough of Despond" and were about to camp for the remainder of the night at a haystack, when through the efforts of one of us a farmer was aroused who apprised the party of the fact that Hardman was only a mile away and could be reached by climbing a steep hill. All dismounted but the driver and the ascent began. They finally arrived at Hardman at 12, midnight. The short cut this time proved the longest way round. On reaching the mill at quite an early hour in the morning, Mr. Parker who was waiting by the telephone, was in waiting at the gate with lantern in hand to receive the weary pilgrims. Soon the cheery voice of Mrs. Parker rang out the second welcome which was as much appreciated would be by sailors returning after a tempestuous voyage. Soon a steaming breakfast was ready and its excellent quality and also quantity sated the fatigued ones. At an early hour the nimrods were in quest of the desired game. But after a 15 minute walk they returned with all the birds seen and that in the singular number. Mr. and Mrs. Parker gave their visitors the freedom of the premises and what with horseback and buggy riding and numerous games it was the most enjoyable outing of the

year. Mrs. Parker enjoyed a splendid reputation as teacher in our public schools, but now possibly as splendid honors are due as entertainer and hostess. Such delicious meals would rival Tefft's very best. And with the good nature and solicitude for the pleasure of their guests for Messrs. Parker, Gleason and Maxwell and their dear old friend Mrs. Parker such a good time was enjoyed that the party was loath to return to town. Numerous pictures were taken which will be on exhibition no doubt. It was the unanimous decision that Mr. Parker has one of the finest homes in Morrow Co. and that our old friend Mrs. Parker seems to have all the necessities for great happiness. Nobody Told Me So.

## OSU Releases Hyslop, High Yielding Wheat

Hyslop, a new, soft, semi-dwarf winter wheat which has a superior yielding record in varied conditions in Western states, is being released by the agricultural experiment stations of Oregon, Washington and Idaho. Dr. Warren E. Kronstad, Oregon State University wheat breeder, made the original cross which resulted in Hyslop in 1960. The parents from which Hyslop was developed represented a high yielding French variety, Nord Desprez, and a semi-dwarf selection, Pullman Selecton 101. The new variety was named for George R. Hyslop, OSU Farm Crops Department head from 1916 until his death in 1943. About 7,000 bushels of the new semi-dwarf variety will be available for fall planting through the Oregon Foundation Seed Project. Dr. Norman Goetze, cereal extension specialist, is coordinating statewide distribution of seed. Hyslop has good milling and baking qualities, equal to or better than other soft winter rapid growth and early spring wheat varieties. Good emergence, recovery and apparent more effective nitrogen utilization also are attributes of this variety. Unusual because of its wide adaptation to growing conditions—dry, irrigated and non-irrigated land—Hyslop has been grown satisfactorily in Eastern Oregon even where winter hardness is sometimes a problem. However, Hyslop should not be grown in areas of the Pacific Northwest where severe winter conditions prevail. The new variety is better in common smut resistance than Gaines and Nugaines. It also resists stripe rust, is moderately resistant to mildew and Septoria (a winter fungus disease) and is moderately susceptible to flag smut. Dr. Robert J. Metzger, USDA geneticist on the OSU campus, tested Hyslop for smut reaction patterns. Other USDA information which helped develop the new variety included milling and baking data from the Western Regional Quality Laboratory at Pullman, Wash., and data from the Uniform Regional White Winter Wheat Nursery (21 locations throughout the Western states). In 5-year tests in the Willamette Valley, Hyslop consistently produced 90-plus bushels of wheat an acre and has exceeded a 100-plus bushel rate yield on irrigated Eastern Oregon land. It has also outperformed commercial varieties under dryland conditions at most locations. During the last 2 years, Hyslop has outyielded all other varieties in the Uniform Regional White Winter Wheat Nursery.
