**Annual Conservation Tour Staged**

There were seven Jones' on hand to greet guests the day of the annual tour of the Morrow County Conservation Man of the Year winner on June 4. They were Mr. and Mrs. Marcel Jones and their son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Ron Jones and Judge and Mrs. Paul Jones and their son, Gary, of Hood River.

Luncheon was enjoyed on the lawn of the Marcel Jones home. The dessert was a cake decorated to look like the ranch complete with Marcel's pride and joy, the fish pond. Ron's wife, Monica, had the fun of decorating the cake.

The tour started in the morning with the first stop at the Ken Turner ranch to see his irrigated crop of beans and some of the problems with water infiltration on the Ritzville soils. Ken pointed out the importance of pre-irrigation to fill the soil profile prior to the growing season.

From there the group went to the Nelson Brothers ranch on the Baseline Road where Don Rydych from the Pendleton Experiment Station has established a weed control demonstration plot. Most of the new weed control chemicals on the market are being evaluated in this plot. Wheat yields and weed control results will be published this fall and will be available for growers use.

The last stop in the morning was at one of the five wheat fertility plots seeded by Harold Kerr, Morrow County Extension agent, who is evaluating differ-

ent rates of nitrogen and sulfur on different soil depths and rainfall levels in the county. Yields and protein levels will be taken from these plots and distributed to interested groups this fall.

Following the luncheon, Bryce Keene piloting the bus took the group up Shobe to see the erosion caused by the storm and resulting flood. This was a graphic picture for the benefits that are derived from erosion control practices.

Back at the ranch, guests enjoyed refreshments courtesy of the hosts and the Morrow Coun-

ty Grain Growers.

At the luncheon Dale Boner reviewed the extent of the soil conservation practices on the Jones' ranches. From strip farming started in 1962, they now have added over 50,000 feet in diversion ditches. Marcel said he wasn't through but had quite a bit more to do.

He gave credit to the work the CCC's had done in the area. He told of the 31 check dams that they had built in Shobe Creek. He is anxious to get his lower land grassed before another flood hits.
