PROPERTY TAX FAX

If you have a question concerning real or personal property please state all the facts as briefly as possible and mail it to your COUNTY ASSESSOR Joyce Ritch, under the name "PROPERTY TAX FAX". Please ask only one question per sheet. Then watch this column for the answer.

I own a summer cabin located on government property. My county assessor allocated \$2,500 to this property site. It seems to me that he should not be able to do this as it is taxation of government property.

ANSWER:
The assessor was correct in his assessment. Based on ORS 307.060 as interpreted by the Supreme Court it is the opinion of the Director of the Department of Revenue the placing of valuation and assessment upon this type of property site is proper. In its interpretation the Supreme Court held that for taxation purposes, the value to property held under permit from the federal government is in its use and the state can tax the value to the person who is using it for the tax period, subject only to a diminution in value resulting from restrictions which would not be applicable to an owner in fee.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL LEVY ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that at the Irigon Rural Fire Protection District special election hereby called to be held on Tuesday, the 20th day of July, 1971, between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 8:00 P.M. Pacific Daylight Time, in and for the Irigon Rural Fire Protection District, there will be submitted to the qualified voters thereof the question of authorizing a serial tax levy for the Irigon Rural Fire Protection District in the sum of \$5,700.00 annually pursuant to Section 11, Article XI

of the Oregon Constitution, to be effective for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1971. The votes shall be by ballot in substantially the following form:

QUESTION SUBMITTED TO THE LEGAL VOTERS OF THE IRIGON RURAL FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

Measure No. 1: Shall the Board of Directors of the Irigon Rural Fire Protection District be authorized to make a serial tax levy in the amount of \$5,700.00 for the fiscal year 1971-1972 for the purpose of purchasing equipment and operational costs.

These proposed taxes are outside and in addition to the limitation imposed by Section 11 of Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

The maximum rate of levy deemed necessary to raise FIVE THOUSAND SEVEN HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$5,700.00) is the sum THREE DOLLARS PER THOUSAND (\$3.00 per \$1,000.00) of true cash value of taxable property within the district.

The voter shall place an (X) or (✓) before the words "Yes, I vote for the serial levy" or before the words "No, I vote against the serial levy" to signify choice.

() YES, I vote for the serial levy.

() No, I vote against the serial levy.

The election is to be held at the old Irigon School in the basement. The polls shall be open at the hour of 8:00 A.M. and remain open until the hour of 8:00 P.M. of the same day, at which time the polls will be closed.
