Flood Watchers Meet

At the meeting of the Flood Watchers Wednesday evening the women presented and discussed several ideas for flood alerts, the advantages of an Auxiliary Police Force, a mobile telephone in the police car and 24-hour police radio contact.

Committees Meet In Boardman for Morrow Economic Plan

Morrow County was declared an area of substantial unemployment the first part of June.

This means that Morrow County is eligible for inclusion under Title I of the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965. Grants and loans for establishment of business enterprises could be available to qualified applicants in this county.

It may be possible under Title I for the Port Commission to build, for instance, cold storage facilities for rental or even a processing plant for rental. These are only examples. The Forest Service installations at Tupper were built under the provision of a similar act.

To qualify for inclusion in the terms of the act, an Overall Economic Development Plan must be written and put together by interested citizens for Morrow County. This plan would be similar to the recent 10-year planning report of the Extension Service, much of which could be incorporated into the Oregon Economic Development Program.

Judge Paul W. Jones has requested a number of citizens to serve on various committees to draw up the plan. They will meet with Tom Current of the Economic Development Administration in Heppner on Wednesday, July 7 at 1 p.m. at the County Courthouse.

Churches to Picnic On Independence Day

Each July 4 is the occasion of a festive picnic, fellowship and outing for the congregations of the Lexington Church of Christ and the First Christian Church, Heppner. Held at Cutsforth Park each year the outing gives opportunity for relaxation and fun in one of Morrow County's fine parks.

After an afternoon spent in God's great outdoors, the congregations will gather, still at Cutsforth Park, for their evening worship service. The young people of the two churches will be in charge of the service, leading songs, reading scriptures, etc., and Mark Neal the churches' summer interim minister, will bring the message of the evening.

Eastern Oregon Loses Sen., Rep.

Eastern Oregon, already dominated by more populous Western Oregon in state government, will soon lose a state senator and a state representative east of the Cascades when Secretary of State Clay Myers submits his reapportionment plan to Governor McCall before Aug. 1. The change, caused by recent population shifts will decrease the area's contingent to Salem to four senators and eight representatives.

Sec. Myers, in public statements made Monday, hinted in addition at the possibility of creating more sub-districts in an effort to give minority groups a fair amount of representation. The sub-districts are only found in Multnomah County.

The Secretary will start forming the new boundaries after July 1, aided by three new staff members — a Democrat, a Republican and an Independent. He is now welcoming concerned advice about legislative reapportionment from the general public.

Secretary Myers inherited the job of submitting district boundaries to the Governor after the 1971 legislature failed to do so.

Community Pride — New State 4-H Project

Smiling faces were in evidence as the first Community Pride program was launched recently during 4-H summer school at Corvallis.

Mrs. Louis Shade of Irrigon participated in the event by assisting in the planting of a cherry tree on the Oregon State campus. Also participating were K. G. Johnson, public relations Counsel for Standard Oil Co. of California and E. E. Bonham, 4-H County agent of Wasco County.

Community Pride is a program co-sponsored by 4-H and the Standard Oil Co. of California. It seeks to improve and beautify the local environment. It was begun in California some 5 years ago. Since that time the program has expanded into Hawaii, Arizona, Nevada, Idaho and this year is being introduced into Oregon.

Four-H clubs decide what makes a good Community Pride project, this could be sprucing up a neglected county park, a community-wide anti-litter campaign, or any other project for community betterment.

Projects are submitted by the clubs on a special report form through their County agent to the State 4-H organization at Oregon State. A selection of winners is made by state leaders who issue certificates acknowledging the beneficial work of the clubs.

In the fall a conference will be sponsored by Standard Oil Co., where winning clubs will be further honored and presented specially designed ceramic and walnut plaques.

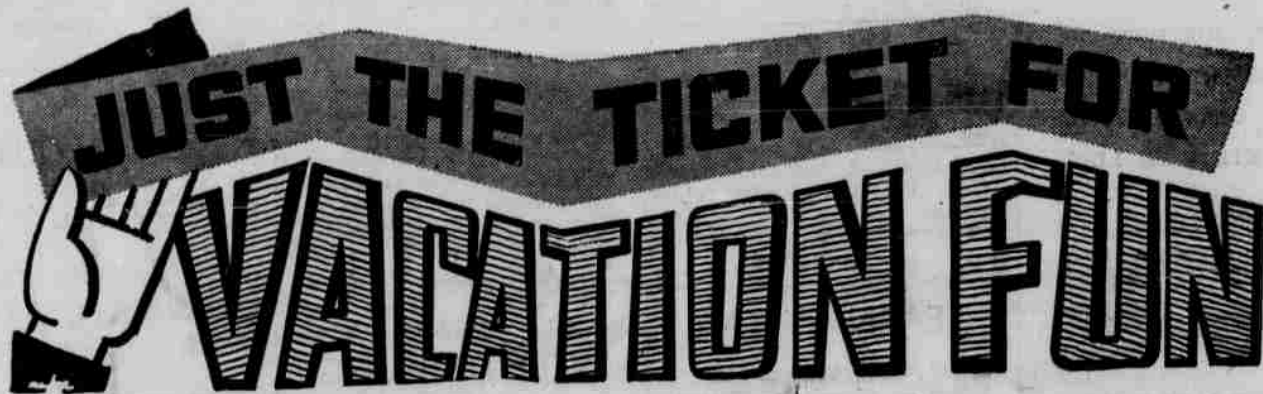
He has toured with "Up With People" a musical program presented by a group of young people to equate the negative effect of student riots.

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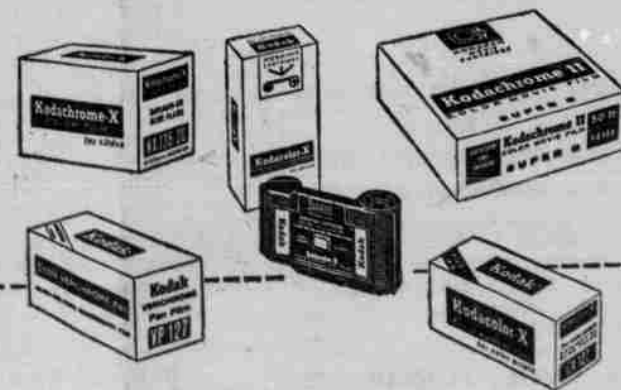
