Puncture Vine Alert
Now is the time to wage war on that nasty menace, the Puncture Vine. This obnoxious plant starts growing rapidly in late spring or early summer and should be sprayed or hoed out. It generally grows along railroads, roadsides, barnyard lots, livestock, loading yards, some fairgrounds and occasionally in pastures and range land. Road shoulders and other dryland sites are "ice cream" for this weed plant.

This annual nuisance spreads only by seed as nutlets stick to vehicle tires, hoods, fur, wool, hay or most anything else and therefore it is important to wipe it out early.

Means of Germination
To eliminate this bright green plant with stems radiating, star-like, from the ground, it is important to keep it from producing seed. Chemical sprays such as 2,4-D or soil sterilant may be used. Another effective method is hoeing it up, placing it in a cardboard box to dry and then burning it. However, if hoed, check again in two or three weeks as chances are you'll have another crop.

The Ione Garden Club did their part in the campaign by not only pulling it out but placing posters in Ione enlisting aid. Dr. Huber has been battling the monster for the past two years effectively as they hope they have cleared their ranch of it for awhile.

Puncture vine is well scattered now but if a joint effort to wipe it out were implemented, hopefully it could be kept to a minimum.
