QUESTION SUBMITTED TO THE LEGAL VOTERS OF THE IRRIGON RURAL FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

Measure No. 1: Shall the Board of Directors of the Irrigon Rural Fire Protection District be authorized to make a serial tax levy in the amount of \$3,700.00 for the fiscal year 1971-1972 for the purpose of purchasing equipment and operational costs. These proposed taxes are outside and in addition to the limitation imposed by Section 11 of Article XI of the Oregon Constitution. The maximum rate of levy deemed necessary to raise FIVE THOUSAND SEVEN HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$5,700.00) is the sum THREE DOLLARS PER THOUSAND (\$3.00 per \$1,000.00) of true cash value of taxable property within the district.
