WHAT'S COOKIN'?

Harold Kerr says he's having trouble getting their cucumbers to set on. We had the same trouble with our tomatoes... but at last the little green ones are showing all over the vines. Our cucumbers are going great. I clipped this recipe from the Oregonian as a Scandinavian Cucumber Salad. My grandmother and my mother and myself used vinegar-water-salt-pepper mixture for sliced cucumbers and onions. This is a variation from that one and so good, too. I used my first two cucumbers and onions and took it to the Rodeo Court potluck the night of the coronation.

Sweet-Sour Dressing
Combine 1/2 cup vinegar, 2 tablespoons water, 1/2 tsp. salt, 3 tablespoons sugar, 1/8 tsp. freshly ground black pepper and 3 to 4 tablespoons finely chopped fresh dill or half-dill/half parsley.

Cucumbers should be sliced as thinly as possible or cut in long julienne strips, according to choice. Let stand at least 3 hours before serving, undrained, in the marinating dress, true Scandinavian style.

Local tomatoes are now available for home canning. Because of safety factors the method of canning tomatoes has been changed this year. Judith Forest, Extension food and nutrition specialist at Oregon State University, asks that all home-makers take a close look at the procedure they are following.

Up to date directions call for the addition of two teaspoons of vinegar or lemon juice per quart (or one teaspoon per pint) of tomatoes.

Why add vinegar or lemon juice to tomatoes? Because if tomatoes canned in a boiling water bath are not sufficiently acid, there is the danger that clostridium botulinum, if present, will grow. These bacteria produce a toxin that causes botulism which can be fatal if even a small amount is consumed.

Research has shown that under certain conditions the acidity of tomatoes varies. Tomatoes of any variety may have a low acidity due to environmental influences (soil, moisture, weather), the degree of ripeness and other factors.

Ladybugs who are the favorite of all beetles, are little eating machines feasting on aphids and scale insects. The larvae of the ladybug eat even more aphids than the adult ladybug.

Mr. and Mrs. Richard Girard plan to move from the Episcopal Parish House at 340 S. Green into the house where the Ellis Pettyjohns lived.

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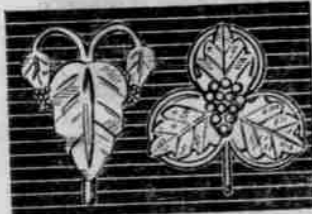
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
