Irrigon Plans for Emergencies

Mayor Pro tem, Vernon Stewart presided at the August meeting of the Irrigon City Council in Mayor Wilson's absence. Discussion in the meeting centered around standard operating procedures for emergencies. The need for such procedures was quite evident during the recent failure of the No. 1 well pump, which occurred when the Mayor was out of town. The malfunction, which required an emergency hook up to a previously used well, subjected city water users to extremely low pressure for several days until adjust-

ments were made. The matter was tabled until the next meeting.

Formation of a vector control District for the Irrigon area was also discussed. Because information was lacking as to tax cost and general feeling in the community about such a district, the matter was tabled until the September Council session, when a more concise report could be made.

Puncture vine on City streets have been sprayed and although it was generally conceded that the project was a month late some unmaturing plants were eliminated. Need of an earlier application of spray in future years was agreed upon.
