There were 82 contestants from 40 states and one Canadian Province. Marci finished in the top 14 and was considered for 5th place in the finals. She won a plaque and an Angus head charm. They showed heifers that were entered in the National Angus Futurity Show, largest Angus Show on the North American Continent. The contestants drew for the heifers to be shown at a luncheon before the contest the first day. The finalists and honorable mentions were named on that day. The finalists were to come back the next morning to compete for the top five and drew for heifers the night before at a banquet. Marci drew a heifer owned by Sir Williams Farms from New York that sold for \$88,000. While there, Marci went on tours of many famous race horse farms, such as Spendthrift Farms and Castleton, saw Nashua, Majestic Prince, Swaps and many others. She saw tobacco fields and many Colonial Style homes.
