the work on Upper Shobe Creek and the channel work will mean a much lighter flood that the creek can hold.

He read a request from Governor Tom McCall addressed to President Nixon asking approval of the \$300,000 funds for planning for the Willow Creek Project and \$400,000 for next year's planning. He asked Mr. Nixon for a high priority for the project.

As soon as the environmental approval is received, the Army Engineers expect to come in and widen and deepen the Shobe Creek channel. The Army Engineers will pay for that work which is expected to cost nearly \$60,000. However, the project cannot be completed unless the bond issue passes to provide money for moving the sewer and water pipes.

Add Garbage Equals No Blow In County

This week saw another step in the development of Boeing land for agriculture. The first two loads of household garbage came from Portland on Tuesday. This had been through a hammer mill and grinder and includes glass and tin. It has been reduced to small particles. About 200 tons will be required to cover the 6-acre test plot. It will be covered with 2 inches, 4 inches, 6 inches and 12 inches. This will be discd into the soil and irrigated.

A cover crop of alfalfa and pasture grass will be planted. It is expected to be completed by the 10th of September.

Elton Weekes, Boeing's project manager, is excited about this new venture. He has worked closely with Morrow County Extension and Soil Conservation Service to determine the pattern for the experimental plot. Most of this soil is Quincy soil and will blow as soon as the surface is broken. The addition of this humus and irrigation is expected to cut down on the blow until the cover crop can come up and hold the soil.

Results will be noted carefully to determine the best depth to apply the household garbage.

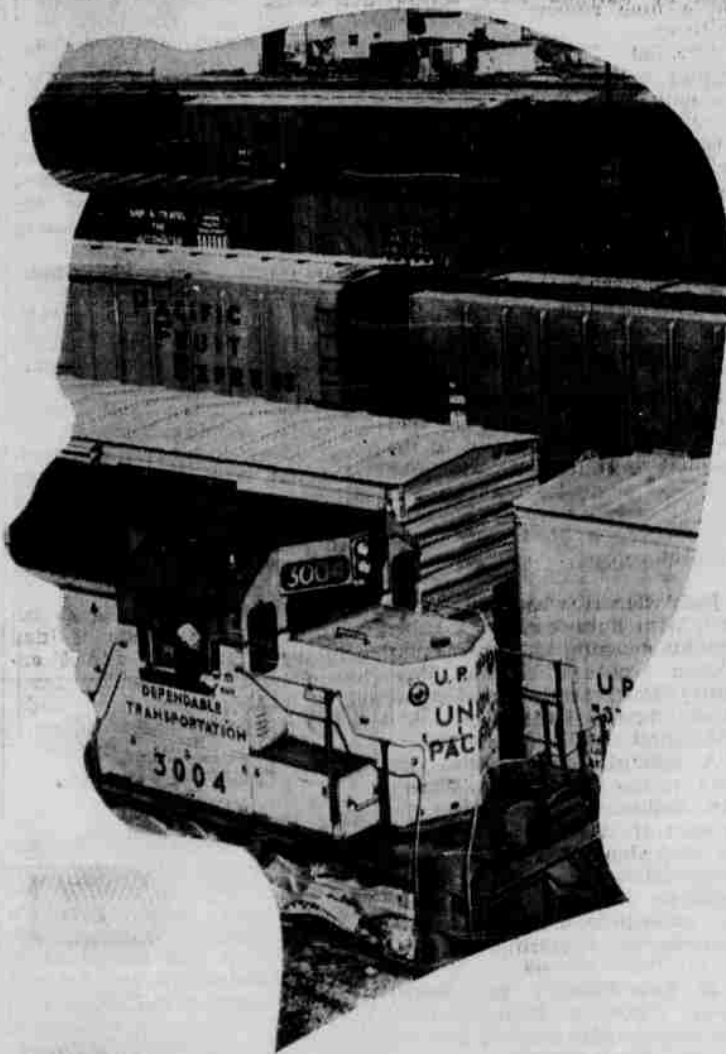
