

Competition Offered In Open Class Clothing

Mrs. Jerry Brosnan and Marilyn Bergstrom were the superintendents of the Open Clothing Class A. Only one article in each division was to be exhibited by one person. Although the exhibitor may enter as many of the divisions as she may like with the stipulation that the garment must have been made and completed since the last fair. First place brought \$2.50 to the blue ribbon holder, second place \$1.50 and third place \$.75. The grouping in Lots were under the headings of Dresses, Children's Clothing, Miscellaneous Clothing and Senior Citizen Projects. The Miscellaneous Clothing gave \$1.50 first place; 1.00 second place; and .75 third place. The same premiums went to the Senior Citizens.

In the Dress Division under Cotton, Francine Evans from Irigton placed first; Shirley George, second; and Kathy Wahl third. In the Cotton Blend Dress Division, Ruth Bergstrom of Heppner placed second; Debbie Yocom of Lexington placed third; and Diana Raymond of Heppner was also judged in this class. In the Dress Division, made with Stretch material were Ann Griffith with a second and Diana Cutsforth of Lexington with a third. Diane Anderson of Heppner placed second with her sportswear in the Stretch Clothing Division.

Under the Dress Division made of Synthetic Silk were, Bonnie Culp of Heppner with a blue; Mrs. Roland Bergstrom of Ione with a red; Juanita Ryan of Irigton with a third. Also entering that class were Ruth Bergstrom of Heppner, Diana Cutsforth of Lexington, and Marianne Pettyjohn of Ione.

Mrs. Roland Bergstrom of Ione placed first in the Dresses made with Wool or a Wool Blend and Ruth Bergstrom of Heppner placed third.

In the Cotton Skirt division, Ruth Bergstrom of Heppner placed first. Also entering that division was Valerie Raymond of Heppner.

Ruth Bergstrom entered her skirt in the Skirts made with a wool blend and came out with a second.

In the jacket division, lined wool or wool blend, Juanita Ryan of Irigton placed first and Tana Rauch of Lexington placed third.

Grace McKinney of Ione placed second in the unlined vest division. Also in the Vests Division were Juanita Ryan of Irigton placing first, Ruth Bergstrom of Heppner placing second, and Bonnie Culp of Heppner placed third.

In the Jacket with Dress Division, Diana Ball of Heppner won second.

Alice Vance of Heppner placed first in the Western Skirt Division.

In the Cotton Skirt division, Ruth Bergstrom of Heppner placed first with the sewing on her skirt.

Juanita Ryan of Irigton placed first with the garment she made and entered in the wool-wool blends division.

In the Cotton Blouse division, Mabel Heath of Heppner placed first, Ruth Bergstrom of Heppner placed second, and Kathy Wahl placed third. In the division for blouses made of other fabrics, Carrie Le Blanc of Irigton placed second and Diana Ball of Heppner placed third.

Francine Evans placed first in the women's wool or wool blend coat division, with Kathy Wahl of Heppner placing second and Jill Chitty's coat coming in third.

Under the sports and play clothes division, Mrs. Roland Bergstrom of Ione placed first, Kathy Wahl placed second and Diane Anderson of Heppner placed third. Also entering in this class were Doris Albright, Diana Ball of Heppner, Jill Chitty of Heppner and Mary Anne Palmer of Ione.

A new classification this year is the Lingerie Division. Carrie Le Blanc of Irigton placed second and Kathy Wahl also entered her garment.

Beverly Doherty of Ione won first in the formal division, Mrs. Marvin Chitty, second, and Jill Chitty, third.

In the maternity dress division, Judy Wright of Heppner placed second, Kathy Wahl of Heppner placed third. Kathy Wahl placed first with her maternity sportswear.

In the children's division, made with cottons or blends, Beverly Doherty of Ione placed

In the sports or play clothes division, Ruth Bergstrom of Heppner placed first, Ruth McCabe of Ione placed second, and Pat Dougherty of Heppner placed third. Also entering their garments in this category were, Diane Anderson of Heppner, Judy Wright of Heppner and Donna Mallory also of Heppner.

In the sleepwear division, Betty Schmeder of Irigton placed first and Fran Privett of Heppner placed second.

This year there was also a category of remodeled clothing. In this division Ruth Bergstrom of Heppner placed second, and Carrie Le Blanc of Irigton placed second. Also entering this division was Kathy Wahl.

Making the good old kitchen aprons, as useful as ever were Ruth Bergstrom of Heppner with her blue ribbon, Ida Farra of Heppner with her red ribbon and Myrthe Huwe of Irigton with her white ribbon.

Ruth Bergstrom had the only entry in the Fancy Apron division, she placed first with her apron.

He is survived by his wife, one son, Gerald Peck; two daughters, Mrs. Dave (Erna Bell) Mittelsdorf and Shirley Ziellinski; ten grandchildren and one great grandchild, all of Boardman. One son, Billy, preceded him in death.
