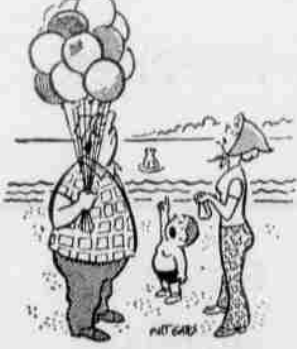

Ground Broken for New Catholic Church

First ground was broken this week for the construction of the new church for St. Patrick's parish when a crew of workmen from McCormack and Foley, contractors of Pendleton, arrived. The contract calls for a \$12,575 structure finished in brick veneer. It will be 66 feet long by 32 feet wide.

The church is being erected on the site of the old Reid planing mill on north Gale street recently purchased by the parish. Father Frank McCormick has taken personal supervision of the work for the church and assistance is being given in work by members.

Attainment of the project is the result of several years planning by the church and the community generally is showing its appreciation of the enterprise.

Presentation, delivery sincere, natural, distinct, introduction complete, interesting, skill in workmanship, illustrative material, materials equipment orderly and visible, steps made clear, proper equipment, effective cooperation (team), concise summary, answers to questions, is all included in the second part of the evaluation and in the third part comes, practical subject, central theme or idea, accurate information, and complete information. And in the results of the evaluation these are considered, finished product, method, principle, general effect on audience, a "show how" demonstration.
