This gifted cook and 4-H Club leader has been known to stress, "Have all your ingredients on hand when you start!"

It was on the spur-of-the-moment that she decided to enter the contest. She won several years ago and had decided to quit while she was ahead. But on the morning of the deadline for entering the contest, she decided to give it another try.

On reading the recipe, she discovered, of all things, it required butter and she didn't have any. A quick call to all her neighbors she discovered one with butter about 8 miles away.

She held it "in her hot little hand" all the way home to bring it to room temperature.

She knew she didn't have time to let her cake cool before she frosted it and get into Heppner by the deadline. Necessity is the mother of invention. It could cool as she drove.
