

4-H Showmanship is Big Drawing Card At County Fair

4-H Dairy Showmanship

Rick Drake won champion in 4-H Senior Dairy Showmanship. There were three classes of Dairy Showmanship. All placing in Junior Showmanship received blue ribbons, Maureen Healy 1st, Janice Healy 2nd and Ron Currin 3rd.

All Intermediates received blue ribbons. Placings were Karen Richards 1st, Sandy Bennett 2nd and Mary Ann Greenup 3rd.

All Seniors in 4-H Dairy Showmanship also received blue ribbons. Placings: Rick Drake 1st, Joan Healy 2nd and Judy Bennett 3rd.

Then the No. 1 placings competed and Rick Drake was named Champion 4-H Dairy Showman and Karen Richards Reserve Champion.

4-H Goat Showmanship

Mark and Peggy Schlichting were the only contestants in this event. They both received blue ribbons and Mark was named Champion Goat Showman and Peggy Reserve Champion.

4-H Swine Showmanship

There were only two classes of 4-H Swine Showmanship. Clint Carlson was judged No. 1 showman in the Junior Division. Other Blues in this group were Wade West, Stuart Keene, Keven Hoguewood, Daniel Van Schoiack, Donald Richards, Irrigon, Krynn Robinson and Red to Kurt McKinney.

Intermediate Swine

Phil Carlson was named top showman of the 4-H Intermediate Swine Showmanship contest. Other blue ribbons went to Robert Richards, Karen Richards, Kitty Bellamy, Kristi Hoguewood, Kelwayne Hoguewood, Kimee Hoguewood, Donna Bellamy and Red to Bill Van Schoiack.

Then the top two Junior showmen and the top two Senior showmen matched. Robert Richards was named Grand Champion Swine Showman and Phil Carlson Reserve Champion.

This was a switch as is occasionally seen in Showmanship contests. In the first contest Phil had been named as the No. 1 showman for the Intermediates and Robert Richards in the No. 2 spot.

Following each contest, the judge gives reasons for placing the contestant as he did and indicates ways how they can improve. When they come back into the ring for the second showing, if the contestants have learned from the judges' recommendations, they have improved themselves.

Sheep Showmanship

Sheep Showmanship superintendents did a reverse and had the Senior Sheep Showmanship contest first. This gave the Intermediates and Juniors a chance to observe and learn from the older members.

Senior Sheep Showmanship

John Sumner was first in the Senior Division and Susan Healy 2nd. They both received blue ribbons. Kathleen Bartlett and Judy Bennett red ribbons.

Intermediate Sheep Showmanship
