Collector's Corner (Adults)

Winners of the Antique Household Articles division were: Neva Matteson, Heppner, 1; Viola Burger, 2; Mrs. John Hopper, Heppner, 3.

Found Articles, Sun-colored Bottles, Miniature Bottles

Found Articles which were judged best were: Charlene Papineau, Lexington, 1; Ashley McCabe, Ione, 2; Beatrice Luciani, Echo, 3. The winning old, sun-colored bottle was from Curtis Culp, Heppner, and Viola Burger took second place. In collections of miniature bottles, Jo Huston, Hardman, was 1st, Curtis Culp, 2; Laurel Cannon, Ione, 3.

Old Beverage Bottles, Most Unusual Bottle, Medicine Bottles

Heppner's Hazel Bauman's beverage bottles were 1, Laurel Cannon, 2; and Curtis Culp, 3. The most unusual bottles were: Betty Christman, 1; Laurel Cannon, 2; and Ida Farra, Heppner, 3. Best medicine bottles came from Betty Christman, 1; Laurel Cannon, 2; and Curtis Culp, 3. Hazel Bauman also won a blue ribbon on pottery beverage container.

Antique Preserve or Canning Glasses, Insulators, Cups, Saucers

Betty Christman, 1; Jo Huston, 2; and Mattie Green, Heppner, 3, took honors with collections of 3 old preserve or canning glasses. Insulators were in two classifications: pottery and glass. Ironware, Ink Bottles, Crockery, Lamps, and Woodenware

Paul Hisler Shows Old Timer Saddle

Many a cowhand stopped at the Morrow County Fair this year to admire this old saddle owned by Paul Hisler. He bought it about 40 years ago from old timer Fred Albert, who home-stayed on the Butter Creek. Paul got it along with horses and harness. He used it for a spare but found it really had too much back and front on it. Stamped on the back is G L Co. Those who know, think this may be a George Lawrence saddle from Portland.

The age of the saddle is unknown but is said to be a favorite of the champion horse breaker, Dave Pressley. Dave was born in the Willamette Valley but his family home-stayed lower Butter Creek where Bill Healy now lives. When he was married he moved to the ranch where Allan Hughes now lives. He was one of the greats with horses. He was very good with a lasso and branding iron, too. He is said to have broken more horses than any other man in Morrow County. He used to break wild

horses for remounts for the Army.

Old timers recall how he looked. He always wore a mustache. He fit in a saddle like a kid glove. He wore his Stetson in a peak with a front crease. And he chewed lots of "tobacco".

He died as he wanted to "with his boots on" at the Palmer place working with horses. The Palmer place is now the Percy Hughes place above Paul Hisler's.

Zetta Brosnan remembers him well. She also recalls when her husband's father, Jerry Brosnan, wintered 400 horses on the Sands between Irrigon and Boardman. In 1899 there was a bad snow and the horses ate their manes and tails. Mrs. Tom Harris of Heppner is Mrs. Pressley's daughter.

HUNTERS



PLEASE RESPECT THE RIGHTS OF OTHERS

IF CAMP FIRES ARE PERMITTED on lands where you plan to hunt, then make sure the fire at your hunting camp is built in an open spot which is free from flammable material such as dry grass or forest litter. Camp fires are not to be left unattended, and must be completely extinguished before leaving your camp to hunt.

FIRES are not permitted outside your camp area during the closed fire season. The season will not end until general statewide rains occur and an official proclamation is issued terminating the fire season.

If you smoke in the woods do so in a safe place. DO NOT smoke while traveling on foot or horseback. Stop, clear a spot, then rest and enjoy your smoke. Don't flip cigarettes and cigar stubs or pipe ashes. In the spot you have cleared grind the ashes or snipe into the earth with the heel of your shoe.

The weeds, grass, brush and timber may be wet now, but a few hours of sunshine will quickly dry them out.

District Foresters, Forest Rangers and Range Managers are asking your cooperation this year to protect your hunting areas and to KEEP OREGON GREEN.
