Red Cross Rep Tells Disaster Differences

Art Cross, Disaster Representative from San Francisco discussed the Red Cross responsibility in disaster at a meeting of the Board of Director of the Umatilla County Chapter American Red Cross last Wednesday evening at the Pendleton Elks Club. Mr. and Mrs. Charles Heard of the Morrow County chapter attended.

Mr. Cross reviewed the responsibilities of the Red Cross in a Presidential Declared Disaster

as compared with a Non-Presidential Declared Disaster.

The Red Cross will fulfill emergency needs in food, clothing and shelter in either disasters. In a Presidential Declared Disaster, victims are assisted in using Government resources as much as possible. They will talk with the people and refer them to the government agency that can best help. FHA, SBA, HUD are all people assisting programs. They replace what is lost. Red Cross replaces what is needed.

The Red Cross has a budget figure of 10 million annually for disaster and anticipates 600 disasters a year. Hurricanes during August, September and October often require supplemental fund drives.

Hurricane Camille Cost ARC 24 Million

Local chapters are encouraged to develop manpower and skills that can be put into operation in case of emergency.

Heppner well knows the speed and care with which the Red Cross responds in a time of disaster. Mrs. Jerry Sweeney acted as the Red Cross liaison to provide washers, dryers, freezers, refrigerators, stoves, furnaces and many other needs to the victims of the May, 1971 flood in Heppner. She processed the applications following the instructions of Clint Pryor, director of Disaster Services from Spokane.

A training course will be given in Pendleton in November in these procedures of providing immediate emergency assistance. It is hoped that several from Morrow County may go over.

Leather is 4-H Pace Setter

Items made of leather are always in good taste, but leather is now big in youth fashions as well, from wide leather belts to coats.

Oregon 4-H members enrolled in leathercraft projects are a step ahead of the game in learning not only how to be creative in leather, but also how to care for leather goods.

Under the direction of volunteer adult leaders, Nancy Myers of Pine City and Jane McRoberts of Heppner, 4-H leathercraft members learn not only how to change leather into decorative and useful articles, but also about the history, selection, care and value of leather.

The 4-H leathercraft project, which last year attracted Morrow County members is divided into seven phases, starting with the basic tools necessary in leather carving, and become increasingly sophisticated.

As the 4-H member moves through the leathercraft project, he will learn edging and lacing techniques, background dyeing, figure carving, and other skills used in leatherworking.

The leathercraft project is designed so that the 4-H member may advance at his own speed. All phases, except the beginning one, may be repeated a second year.

Further information about the 4-H leathercraft program may be obtained at the Morrow County extension office in Heppner.

Every community in Morrow County has young people interested in 4-H leathercraft. Adult or teen leaders are needed in Ione, Boardman, Irrigon. More leaders are needed in Heppner.
