The Drifters

The scene of The Drifters is vast, its characters and action NOW. Six of its eight major characters are young—twenty-one or under. This is a big story composed of many stories—stories of danger and violence and courage, of sex and love, of racial and religious conflict, of the drug and rock subculture that many of the young have become involved with and many of their elders concerned about.

Inside Looking Out

Inside Looking Out, an autobiography. The authors' early life story is a melodrama: a French Canadian family of thirteen children, a run-down farm, disorganized, unprofitable, the boys going out barefoot in all weather to tend the cattle, the girls diapering each new baby as it came along. The mother became an alcoholic and the father bitter and taciturn. Harding left home at 17, lived in a boys home in New York for three years. His book is recommended above all for its candor and integrity.

Whitewater

Whitewater, author Paul Horgan writes of a particular place and time—the American Southwest at mid-century; but like every true novel, it is about us all. Mr. Horgan's thirteenth novel, set in a small Texas town during World War II, tells how three teenagers, Phil, Billy and Marilee, grow vigorously toward adulthood. But for two

of the three this joyous grasp on life leads to a tragic denouement.

Voyage by Bus

Voyage by Bus, Leonard Wibberly. A warm and hearty narrative of family adventure by land yacht. Mr. Wibberly, his wife, their six children and the family cat set out from their Southern California home to voyage through the American West. The trip brings them through Oregon to Ione where they pass the night. The author has written a brief description of the town in form of a message to six young men whose names appear on the World War II memorial at Ione Memorial Field. Enjoyable reading, amusing, and descriptive.
