

### Oris Padberg Services Today

Oris Ransom Henry Padberg died at St. Anthony Hospital in Pendleton on Monday. Mr. Padberg was 73 years old and had lived in Lexington his entire lifetime. He started the Padberg Machinery business there with his son Elden in 1947 after farming for 20 years and working several years with Ralph Jackson's Implement business at Lexington.

Services today (Thursday) will be at 2:00 at the Heppner Masonic Temple. Judge Paul W. Jones acting Worshipful Master of AF & AM No. 120 will officiate. Mr. and Mrs. Carl Marquardt will sing "Rock of Ages" and "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere."

Oris Padberg was born March 31, 1898 in Lexington, son of John H. Padberg and Del Lieualten. On May 11, 1919 he was united in marriage to Katie Fridley at Lexington. Their 50th Wedding anniversary guest book was signed by 159 persons at a lovely gathering in the hall of Holly Rebekah Lodge in Lexington.

Mr. Padberg has been a member of Lexington IOOF, and Ione AF & AM No. 120 for more than 25 years.

Besides Mrs. Padberg, he is survived by a daughter Mrs. Doris Vinson of Monument, sons Elden and Charley, Lexington, a brother Archie of Heppner, eight grandchildren, and nine great-grandchildren.

The active bearers will be Bill Padberg, Darrell Padberg, Earl Padberg, Lindsay Kincaid, George Miller, and Lewis Halvorsen. Serving as honorary bearers will be Ralph Jackson, C. C. ### P. O. Has Late Mail Distribution

In order to comply with the latest labor laws per collective bargaining agreements, part time employees utilized on a split shift basis must be scheduled over a period not to exceed a 10 hour span.

Since the local Post Office has been spreading assignments for part time employees over an 11 hour day on a split shift basis, compliance with the new law necessitates having such employees report for work at 8:00 a.m. instead of 7:00 a.m. Failure to adhere to the law's requirements would necessitate the payment of overtime, for which there are no funds. It is anticipated all first class mail will be boxed up by not later than 9:00 a.m., and all other mail by not later than 10:00 a.m. Mail for delivery by Star Routes 1 and 2, will be dispatched on a variable schedule of 9:30 a.m., or upon receipt of mail thereafter.

### Community Pride Meets A Big Success



Decide what to do and then follow through! The success or failure of the 4-H Community Pride program depends on the efforts of you and other young people working to improve their communities.

This message was given the Morrow County delegation attending Oregon's first 4-H Community Pride conference in Salem Friday and Saturday (Sept. 24-25).

Representing Morrow County were 4-H members: Peggy Schlichting, Rhonda Sargent and Herb Ekstrom. Mrs. Lynnea Sargent, 4-H leader from Heppner and Don Stangel, 4-H Extension agent accompanied our youth delegates.

The purpose of the first statewide 4-H Community Pride conference, which followed the theme "Youth in Action", was to train 4-H members and leaders how to conduct community improvement programs at home, explained Don Stangel, Morrow Extension Agent.

Community Pride will be conducted as a statewide 4-H activity for the first time during the coming year after successful pilot programs held earlier.

The program will be conducted by 4-H members who will survey the community, select a project and then determine how it will be carried out. In some cases, 4-H members alone will be able to do the job. In others, it is expected that they will work cooperatively with others in the community.

A highlight of the conference was a talk by State Senator Don Willner, Portland, whose topic was "Concerned Youth — Making a Liveable Tomorrow". Another presentation during the conference was a panel of 4-H members discussing ideas and experiences gained from some of the pilot programs.

Additional ideas were illustrated Saturday afternoon when certificates were presented to eight counties for outstanding programs conducted earlier this year as part of the 4-H Community Pride program.

Grant County 4-H members received a citation for their efforts toward completing Monument Park. Much of the effort to date has involved making new plantings in their recreational area.

Young people in Helix identified the need for a community center and set to work to convert a former school building into such a center to win a citation for Umatilla County. So far, 4-H members and others have been able to fix up two rooms for community meetings and a third room for a library. Their future plans include a youth recreation room.

The conference was planned by a committee of 4-H members working closely with staff members of the Oregon State Uni-

versity Cooperative Extension Service and Standard Oil of California, which sponsors the program in the western states.

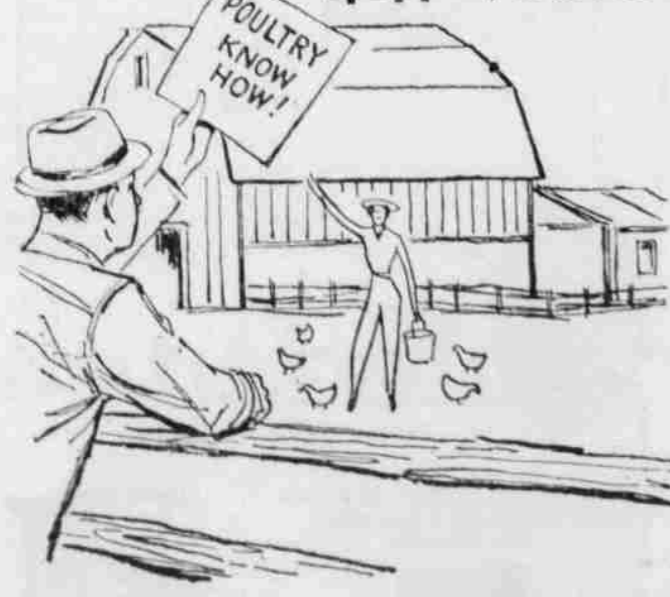
