TO OBSERVE NATIONAL 4-H CLUB WEEK Food Fun And Flexibility

There's a new look about 4-H food and nutrition projects these days and the key words are "fun" and "flexibility".

Morrow County 4-H food members have always had fun learning together but now the enjoyment of learning how to prepare tasty meals should be even greater with the new 4-H food projects, believes Don Stangel, Morrow County extension agent.

The new look extends from the colorful new project books on through changes in food preparation contests at state and county fairs, points out Lois Redman, Oregon State University extension 4-H and youth specialist.

Four of the new projects will be in use in Oregon this year. "Tricks for Treats" is the beginning book which introduces the new cook in simple dishes and recipes which can be used for home entertaining. "All American Foods" introduces the second year member to

the wide variety of dishes prepared and served in the United States.

"Meals for Today—the Easy Way" moves the third year 4-H member into more complicated dishes and menu planning as well as featuring the use of the popular mixes available in today's market.

"Foods with an International Flavor" is the most recent of the new books and introduces foods from such countries as Mexico, Japan, Italy and Germany. Judging from State Fair dinners this year, many of which featured international foods, this will be a popular addition.

Morrow County residents also enjoy eating outdoors, the 4-H Outdoor Cookery project offers young men and women a chance to learn a skill they can use the rest of their lives while having fun learning by doing.

Park board chairman, Orville Buchanan, said the funds would be matched by the Park District. They will be used to provide picnic facilities, a shelter, ball field, play ground equipment and floats for both swimming and water skiing.

The area being developed lies between 6th and 13th streets, North of Washington Avenue. The ground for a Little League field has already been leveled and seeded and is expected to be ready for use by next season.
