He said when he heard the PGE announcement, "The capacity of the Irigun School was reached this year and another 50-50 students will fill Riverside to capacity." Any change in population will mean the school district will have to make additional classrooms.

The District Long Range committee is working on a tentative 5-year and 10-year program. The first year calls for a vocational facility at Heppner. The 2nd year 3 additional classrooms at Irigun. Third year, 4 classrooms added at Riverside. Fourth year extensive remodeling of the Heppner Grade School and auditorium. Fifth year new grade school at Lone.

"The program may have to be spreaded out to combine two projects a year", he said.

Enrollment Figures

As of Sept. 7 there were 161 students enrolled at Riverside. A month later there were 168. Irigun had 165 on Sept. 7 and a month later 173. The 165 is 21 more than were enrolled at the end of the school year.

The increased enrollment is a real challenge welcomed by Supt. Daniels. He pointed out that the facilities will have to be built on the present tax assessment. There will be a lag of about a year before the increased building will be on the tax rolls. This presents a problem of education and explanation.

Judge Paul Jones said when he heard the announcement that he was extremely pleased and gratified that our county has been selected for the location of future nuclear power plants.

He added that this decision by PGE reflects what can be done when the people, local government, industry and others unite in a concerted effort to add to the economy of our area.

The Port Commission is to be commended for their efforts in what may prove to be the most far reaching decision in recent years. It will rank with the decision made years ago to build the first dam on the Columbia River.

The Heppner Mustangs traveled to Maupin Thursday and easily won over the Wasco Redskins 28 to 14.

The Mustangs took the opening kickoff and marched down the field to a TD with Dean Wright going in from 14 yards out. The kick for extra point failed. The Redskins couldn't move the ball and were forced to punt. Heppner took the ball and went in to score with Dean Wright going the last 9 yards for the TD. Again the kick failed for the extra point. Heppner led 12 to 0 at end of first quarter.

Wasco again was forced to punt and the Mustangs marched down the field with Dean going in for the score from 30 yards out. Again kick failed. Wasco went to the air and Dave Eckman picked off a pass and ran it back 40 yards. Barney Marshall went in and ran a TD in from 3 yards and also ran for 2 extra points, making the score 26 to 0.

Heppner then pulled the first eleven and the second unit, mostly frosh and sophs took over. They drove down the field after a Wasco punt and Jerry Gentry took to the air and hit Lloyd Wilson for the fifth TD, making the score 32 to 0.

Wasco was again forced to punt and held Heppner. Dean Wright was sent in to kick and was rushed so he ran and broke away for a 60-yard TD to make the score 38 to 0. The half ended with no further scoring.

Heppner began the second half with the same boys as played the last half of the second quarter. These boys played the entire second half and gave up two TD's to Wasco in the 4th quarter and then won 38-14. The entire squad played with the first team playing only the first quarter and first half of the second quarter.

Heppner's defense was superb with the boys playing their positions well. Gary Watkins and Randy Morris were especially outstanding on defense. On offense Wright made a total of 211 yards on 16 carries.

Bombing Range Road Bids Soon

Bids will be received by the Oregon State Highway Commission Thursday, Oct. 28 in Salem for 10 projects totaling about \$14,988,600.

In Morrow County, bids will be asked for a project of 8.33 miles. This will be for grading and paving on the Irrigon Junction-Middle Fork Juniper Canyon section of the Bombing Range Road. It is located about 3 1/2 miles east of Boardman. The plans call for emulsified asphalt concrete pavement and widening and paving the existing road to two 12-foot lanes. Completion time would be 200 calendar work days. Original estimate of the cost of this job was about \$600,000.
