Irrigon Council Acts on Zoning

IRRIGON—The Irrigon Council took action in the October meeting to file an intent application with the Department of Housing and Urban Development for funds to assist in developing a zoning ordinance for Irrigon.

A land use planning study, made by Kozlovski and Associates, of Lake Oswego, several years ago, resulted in a comprehensive plan for the community, which was adopted by the Planning Commission and the council but was not implemented by an ordinance. Because of new laws governing zoning the City must be either zoned or in the process of accomplishing it by Jan. 1, 1971.

In other action an ordinance amendment was adopted which brought all area listings of properties improved by the water system up to date. Future areas to be served will be covered by ordinance as they are developed. The cost of further extension of mains and laterals will be borne by properties improved.

A set of operating procedures was adopted designating action to be taken in the event of a municipal water outage. In the absence of a full time maintenance employee, Mayor Wilson assists in work projects and maintenance.

Mayor Wilson reported he had been contacted by two individuals the past week who have plans for development projects within the city.

Ted Wilson of The Dalles, who is presently doing some building in Boardman, has stated his intention of building a drive-in restaurant and 4 new homes.

A Mr. Puddy of Walla Walla negotiating for purchase of property for development of a mobile home court, which would be the second within the city.

A survey of the water operations, which has covered two full years, reveals customers numbers are still several short of the anticipated 51. The result is a depreciation loss of approximately \$1000 a year according to Mayor Wilson.
