Heppner Downs Sherman in Final Quarter

next kick-off Sherman again was forced to punt and with the same three ball carriers, Heppner marched in to their third score with Rory Stillman running the last seven yards.

Following the kick-off, Sherman changed quarterbacks and took to the air. John Sumner intercepted their first attempt and the Mustangs—their offense in high gear—rolled to their fourth straight TD with Rory taking the ball in from a yard out. The Huskies, who had played inspired ball all evening, were not to be denied. Although they were aided by a fifteen yard penalty against Heppner, on fourth and fifteen on Heppner's 35 yard line, they threw a desperation pass after the passer was chased all over the field, and connected on the five yard line. They then immediately threw again and passed for a TD and the extra point to make the final score 25 to 8 and help ease the defeat on their homecoming.

Coach Displeased

Coach Hiemstra was displeased with the interior line blocking the first half. Probably the main reason for its breakdown was the absence of Heppner's great center, Tom Cutsforth who sat out the first half due to a hip pointer received in the Wasco game. Tom went in and played only offense the second half but with his presence in the lineup and thus giving Heppner its first line intact, the Mustang offense steam rolled the second half.

Heppner had the full services of Barney Marshall and Rory Stillman for the first time in three weeks, both being injured in the Umatilla game. They responded handsomely with Rory gaining 93 yards and two TD's in ten carries. Barney carried seven times for 43 yards plus doing an outstanding job blocking and on defense filling in at end for Tom Cutsforth and doing an outstanding job.

Dean Wright totaled 154 yards running and 15 yards passing for a total of 169 yards in 26 carries.

Defensively, Heppner's front four, B. Marshall, Ed Strahm,

Bill Jepsen, and Rick Drake were superb as shown by the statistics for Sherman's ground game. They amassed only 52 yards in 21 carries against this four. Heppner's two linebackers assisted the front four very well — Jeff Marshall and Kirk Robinson.

Lloyd Wilson filled in for B. Marshall in the secondary and did outstanding work, also the rest of the secondary, Gary Watkins, Dean Wright, John Sumner and Dave Eckman, with the latter two playing their best game. This secondary allowed Sherman only six pass completions in 17 attempts and intercepted four.
