

## National Officer Visits Lex Lodge

LEXINGTON — Lighted candles and arrangements of fall flowers adorned the tables at the joint meeting of Holly Rebekah Lodge 139 and Lexington Lodge 168 Tuesday night. This meeting was held in honor of a Past Sovereign Grand Master, James Elliott, who was visiting Oregon from his native state of Ohio, and the Grand Secretary of Oregon, Ralph Pauli. The dinner of turkey and all the trimmings was served to 40 members and friends.

The dinner was followed by a short skit by the Rebekahs, "What the Odd Fellows think the Rebekahs do" and two readings by Mrs. Archie Munkers and Mrs. C. C. Jones. The lodges throughout the world have raised \$750,000 for establishment of an Endowed Chair in Ophthalmic Research at the Wilmer Institute of Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore. The Educational Foundation through its Revolving Loan Fund helps students further their education. The lodges have a good youth program, with Junior Odd Fellows Lodges (12-21 yrs) and Theta Rho Clubs for girls (10-21 yrs).

The Rebekah and Odd Fellow Lodges are the only fraternal order permitted to conduct an educational program at the United Nations. The tours are arranged so that the young people on the tour see State Capitals, Washington, D. C., Canada and many historical sights. There are several orphanages and homes for the aged supported by the lodges, in different states throughout the United States. These are but a few of the highlights.
