waters could easily pass over the road without backing up and doing so much damage, Oregon is reluctant to have the "arroyos" or dips as are common in the Southwest. Engineer said the State Highway is short of money and it might be three to four years before a bridge could be installed.

City Recorder Elaine George, will write the State Highway Commission again, making a formal request for State action to lower the road. Council will request help from the County Court on this matter of corresponding with the State.

Councilmen Sweeney and McLeod talked of the Federal Flood Insurance. A "flood plain" has been approved by the County Court. It was reported that advantage of this is the low cost of the insurance. However, it was pointed out there may be unseen disadvantages. After considerable discussion, it was decided to have the City invite the government officials to a public meeting in Heppner to explain the program.

The City will also request the State Water Resources people to ask the Corps of Engineers to compile available flood publications for Morrow County.

Chief Kolkhorst reported a misdemeanor, traffic fines, parking tickets, verbal warnings and one accident. \$162.82 came from meters and \$16 from fines.

City will study a possible government grant for the swimming pool.

City Council complimented the Jaycees for erecting the foot bridge across Shobe Creek.

Sick leave for City employees was discussed. It was suggested Work Sessions be held with the Council and its committees to trash out budget problems and other matters.

al Convention by four clergy and four laity, rather than only one clergyman and one layman, as a missionary district. It also has the right of holding its property thru a board of trustees made up of laity and clergy, rather than under the bishop as corporation sole.

The Missionary District of Eastern Oregon was established in September, 1907, when it was separated from the Diocese of Oregon in the western part of the state, and placed under the missionary leadership of Bishop Robert Paddock. Paddock served until 1920, and was followed by Bishop Remington, 1922-1945; Bishop Barton, 1946-1968; Bishop Spofford, since January 25, 1969.

Meeting in Pendleton on Nov. 19, the district first will assemble for its last convocation as a missionary district. Then it will adjourn and reassemble as a diocese. Saturday night, Nov. 20, there will be a banquet at the Indian Hills Motel, at which Bishop Hines will speak. Bishop Hines also will be the preacher at the main festival Sunday morning services on Nov. 21.

At the present time the Missionary District of Eastern Oregon has one Bishop, 20 full-time clergy, 3 retired clergy, 3 non-parochial clergy, and 5 self-supporting clergy in 12 parishes, 13 missions, and 15 unorganized missions, with 4,162 communicants and 6,926 baptized members.

Bishop Hines visited Eastern Oregon two and a half years ago. But at that time he came only just inside the district, at Ontario for the consecration of the Rt. Rev. William B. Spofford, Jr., as the Bishop of Eastern Oregon.

Bishop Hines was elected Presiding Bishop at the General Convention of the Episcopal Church at St. Louis, Mo., in October, 1964, just two days before his 54th birthday. At that time he was the youngest Presiding Bishop the Episcopal Church ever had. Previous to his election as President Bishop, Bishop Hines was the Bishop of the Diocese of Texas (metropolitan Houston), and several counties surrounding Houston) from 1945 to 1964.
