The new items are recognition or "membership" items. They include the round clover pin for all 1st year members, a choice of a 4-H decal or a chevron (this item is a cloth 4-H sew-on patch) for 2nd year members, and the choice of a special 4-H charm, tie tack or pin for 3rd year members.

Junior Leader and leader pins remain the same as in the past. Empire Builder pins will no longer be available.

Each of the items on the new system is designed to be given to the members at the time they enroll. These items, when worn, mark the youngster as belonging to a 4-H Club. They are not designed or intended to indicate that the youngster met some performance standard.
