WHAT'S COOKIN

For Day of Bread I sent for their 20 prize winning sandwich recipes. They sound real yummy but complicated and I wouldn't have some of the ingredients in my cupboard for a spur-of-the-moment sandwich.

The Glenwood

This makes 6 sandwiches and would be a whole meal.

12 slices whole wheat bread, toasted, buttered
1 medium Bermuda onion, sliced and separated into rings
1 tablespoon butter
1 cup red kidney beans, drained
1 tablespoon chopped pimento
1 tsp. sherry
1/4 tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. pepper
2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese
1 small tomato, diced, about 1/2 cup.

Fry onion in 1 tsp butter until transparent. Remove from heat; add beans, pimento, sherry and seasonings. Stir in cheese, spoon mixture onto 6 toast slices. Broil until cheese bubbles. Sprinkle with diced tomato. Serve immediately open faced with toast points cut from remaining toast.
