**BOARDMAN** — The Boardman Rural Fire District met with the City Council Tuesday night and entered into an agreement whereby the city will house the new rural fire truck and provide manpower for it.

In other action at the meeting, announcement was made of the League of Oregon convention to be held in Portland Nov. 14-16. Mayor Dewey West, Jr., who is a member of the executive board, will be chairman of the small cities meeting on the 16th.

The public hearing on the comprehensive plan for the development of Boardman will be held at the city hall Nov. 17 at 2 p.m.

Penelope was a phenomenon whom no one seemed able to outguess or outmaneuver, but her final success was even to surprise her.
