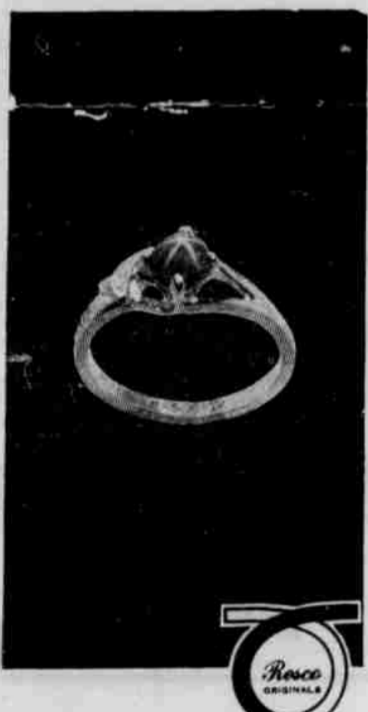
It's A Girl
