and canner. It will have 19,000 acres of potatoes in the Horse Heaven area in eastern Washington, just north of the Columbia River. The largest Concord grape vineyard in the world is being developed in Pasco, Wn., as a joint venture of a land development company and a large potato French fry plant.
"In Wasco County in 1934 there were 1,188 farms. In 1964 the number was 599. There must be many fewer Wasco farmers now.
"The trend to large scale farming will erode our small towns. In 1969, Wasco County farmers sold \$13,537,000 of agricultural products. Most of that money stayed in this county. But out of state farm corporations do not shop on the main street of Dufur or The Dalles or other local Oregon communities.
"Rural and urban citizens must recognize before it is too late that we cannot let huge corporate conglomerates take over agriculture in Oregon."

Irrigon Council Is Very Busy

At the November City Council meeting in Irrigon, Mayor Chester Wilson reported a primary application for an \$800 Federal grant for planning assistance had been filed with and approved by the Intergovernmental Council. He was instructed by the Council to contact the Dept. of Planning at the University of Oregon, regarding assistance in formation and adoption of a zoning ordinance for the City.
The audit report for 1970-71 was in the hands of council members but had not been sufficiently reviewed before the meeting, for approval. It will be presented in the December meeting for discussion and approval.
Two applications for liquor license renewals were approved. A package beer permit was endorsed for Lavern Christiansen's Complete Food Store and for packaged beer and wine permit at Lee LeBlanc's Texaco and Grocery.
A work report to the Council included: winterizing of the City Service Building, Transplanting of a 16 foot tree, donated by A. F. Rucker, to Highway 730 at 8th St., where it can be decorated for Christmas by the Lion's club, Removal of dead poplar trees near the water tank and service lines to the well which had been a potential hazard.

Delivery Deadlines Noted by Postmaster

The Postal Service has set the following deadlines for assured delivery of Christmas parcels:
To Distant States—East of the Mississippi—Dec. 1.
Between adjacent States and Mississippi—Dec. 5.
Assured delivery of parcels to adjacent states and within Oregon—Dec. 10.
Christmas cards mailed by Dec. 10 are assured delivery to all points within the 50 states. Local area cards if mailed Dec. 15, will be delivered by Christmas.
Bulk Parcel Post, because of the vast quantities, is shipped east by train. No longer are fast passenger trains available for this purpose, so therefore, parcels going east travel at freight train speed. Because of the additional travel time involved, patrons are strongly urged to observe the suggested mailing deadlines to avoid a possibility of delay in delivery.
