GAA installation will be held Wednesday, Dec. 1 for all girls grades 9-12 and their mothers from 2:30 to 3:30 in the high school cafeteria.

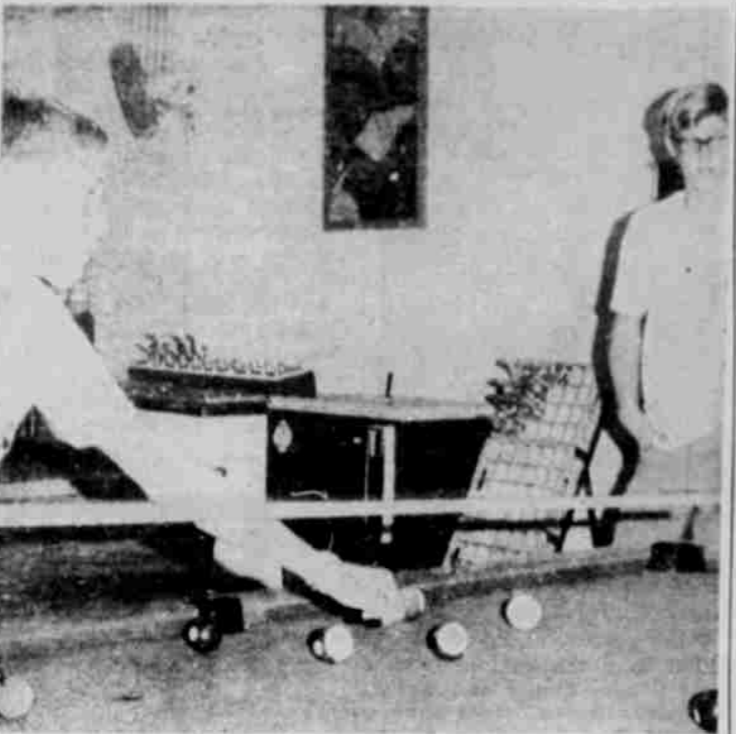
Jerry Carney to Speak

BMC Announcement Good News for High Schools

Blue Mountain Community College announced last night that it will offer to take certain career education courses to high schools in Umatilla and Morrow counties next fall.

Bob Hawk, dean of applied sciences, told the college board of directors that courses similar to two now being conducted on the campus for high school students will be taken to high schools in the college district if interest in the high schools justifies.

Two courses now being conducted on the BMCC campus are Machine Shop and Electricity-electronics, with 31 Pendleton and Pilot Rock high school students enrolled. Another course, Survey in Automotive Mechanics, will be offered here starting next January. Hawk said.

High Schools in the two counties will be asked what courses they want the college to conduct, Hawk said, and the college will honor as many of the requests as possible.

Other new programs being considered by the college include a two-year, Associate Degree Nurse program, a mental health technology program, a nursing program. The board approved tentative plans for the programs but withheld final approval pending more detailed studies regarding costs and the needs of the area. Hawk was authorized to conduct the studies and report back to the board early next year.

Truman Bally, director of admissions, told the board that the college received 12 additional grants from the state scholarship commission. The 12, each worth \$500, are in addition to those allotted last summer.

Over 3000 Carlots Fresh Produce Shipped

Oregon shipped 705 more carlots of fresh produce to market in October than in September. Total shipments for October were 3,108 carlots and making up the bulk of the shipments were potatoes, pears and onions.

Potato shipments totaled 982 carlots; pears 958 carlots and onions 947 carlots.

Other produce checked by the federal-state shipping point inspection service for fresh market shipments during October included: Apples, 113 carlots; filberts, 82 carlots; peaches, 2 carlots; brine cherries, 23 carlots and 1 carlot of miscellaneous produce.

In addition to the fresh produce the inspectors also checked 83,256 tons of potatoes and 14,200 tons of pears for processing.

Bacon Packaging Hearing is Dec. 17

So that persons in different locations in the state will have an opportunity to present their ideas on how bacon sold in Oregon should be packaged the Oregon Department of Agriculture will continue the bacon packaging hearing set for Dec. 10 at Eugene in Portland, Friday, Dec. 17.

The Eugene hearing is to be in Harris Hall of the Lane County Courthouse at 10 a.m. The Portland hearing is set for 10 a.m. in room 441 of the State Office Building, at 1400 S. W. Fifth Avenue.

Regulations being proposed by the Oregon Department of Agriculture would exempt canned products and that bacon wrapped or packaged at the time of purchase. Except for these two exemptions the regulation being proposed would require a clear view of at least one slice of bacon in prepackaged bacon. Packages not meeting this stipulation would be deemed misbranded under the Oregon law.

Persons unable to attend either sessions of the hearing, but having testimony they wish to submit, may do so by sending it to Kenneth E. Carl, Oregon Department of Agriculture, Salem 97310.
