Dick Welch of Portland General Electric Co., made the address of the day. He said we in the Northwest will need 20 power plants in the next 20 years. Three are actually under construction. There is the need for another plant on the line in 1975. This, he explained, would probably be a nuclear power plant at Carty or Six Mile in Morrow County. Construction of a nuclear power plant requires four years. So his firm hopes to get started in this county by 1975.

Cost of the engineering part will be twelve million dollars. Plant will require a cooling pond of 50,000 acre feet.

Mr. Welch praised Morrow County people for their help. He pointed out this help as engineer studies, publicity releases on potential sites and invitation to the Governor to evaluate the sites showed PGE that Morrow County people were friends of nuclear power.

Heating Problems Solved at Hospital, Sprinklers on Agenda

One of the four-bed rooms in the Nursing Home section of the Pioneer Memorial Hospital has been difficult to heat. Last month it was decided to insulate the outside wall and install two baseboard heaters. The installation of two baseboard heaters has corrected the problem.

Recently one of the boilers went out at the hospital. It was 11 years ago that it was said it would last about three more years. The estimate for repair was given at \$1350. At this month's board meeting Mrs. Wyman said it had been repaired.

The sprinkler system is now receiving consideration. Last February Viking Automatic Sprinklers estimated the new system would cost \$4,123. Recently their estimate was \$4,387. Mrs. Wyman was able to obtain a six month's extension due to lack of funds. The bid is expected to be accepted by the Dec. 31 deadline and work would get underway shortly after the bid is let. Mrs. Harry Duvall has donated \$1000 toward the installation.

Donations more than \$200 were received in the Oris Padberg Memorial fund. This makes \$359 in Memorial funds. It was decided to purchase a Wood's Light for examining the eyes and a Diagnostic Exerciser (EKG) with these gifts.
