Current Log Prices

The log market remains stable. The Longshoreman's strike and a freight car shortage has resulted in a lumber buildup in many yards.

In Northeast Oregon, Old Growth Ponderosa Pine is bringing \$50 to \$60 per thousand board feet and Associated Species are bringing \$40 to \$50 per thousand board feet at the mill.

North Central Oregon prices are varying from \$50 to \$80 for Old Growth Ponderosa Pine per thousand board feet, while Associated Species are selling from \$40 to \$65 delivered at the mill.

Always check your buyers and obtain harvesting permits before harvesting any forest products.

Forestry Help for Woodland Owners

The Oregon State Forestry Department through its program of Service Foresters, furnishes free professional advice and information to any woodland owner.

The Service Forester will provide assistance in such phases of forestry as:

a. Government cost sharing programs, under which the woodland owner is paid to improve his timber by thinning, pruning and planting.

b. Commercial logging in which the woodland owner is given data on stumpage and volume estimates, insect dangers, forest law requirements, sample contracts and possible buyers.

c. Insects and Disease in which identification and control information are given.

d. Windbreak information regarding what varieties of trees will best fit your needs and how to plant them.

e. Miscellaneous information as requested on Christmas trees, markets, planting, taxes, fence posts, woodland roads, fire protection and porcupines.
