Farm Machinery 'Know How' Taught at Workshop

How to decide to buy farm machinery was the theme of last week's two-day Farm Machinery Workshop sponsored by Oregon State University Extension Service, reports Harold Kerr, Morrow County Extension Agent.

Dr. Gene Nelson and Clinton Reeder, Extension Specialists in Ag Economics from OSU were the workshop instructors. They discussed the importance of considering all the costs or benefits when deciding to replace a major piece of farm equipment. Most growers take into account such items as depreciation, repairs, and fuel. Other important considerations may be machine efficiency, down time for repairs, tax breaks, value of money if used for alternate uses, etc.

The workshop participants learned some ideas about putting a dollar value on some of the more intangible items which is necessary when making a buying decision. Work sheets were used to compute actual costs of such decisions as new vs. used buying now as compared to waiting a year and how to compare various depreciation schedules.
