

Boardman Asks Census Recount

BOARDMAN — The Boardman City Council discussed the possibility of asking for a new census count at their meeting last week. While the population of Boardman is now listed at 250 with the state of Oregon, their preliminary count in 1970 was only 154, and the city demanded and received a recount that brought it up to 228 at that time.

One of the problems in getting a recount is that the bureau that handles the procedure charges \$300 plus other costs to do the job. Previously Boardman was able to make estimates that were recognized by the state bureau. This is no longer true.

The council is interested in recording an increase because it reflects in the amount received per capita in state tax revenue returns from liquor and gasoline taxes.

In other action the council voted to have a two way radio installed in the city hall where by the city can contact the county offices at Heppner, as requested by Sheriff John F. Molohan.

Council Enters Agreement

The council entered into an agreement with the Boardman Rural Fire District for the city to furnish them housing for their truck and man power for the equipment.

Christmas lights on the outside of the hall was discussed and decision was made to put them up in cooperation with others in town in the lighting contest.

Board Members Elected

Three different elections were held in Boardman Monday of last week. Hazel Miller was re-elected to the board of the Boardman Cemetery Maintenance District for a three year term with a total of 37 votes. Only 38 votes were cast at the election.

Harold Baker with 31 votes and Arthur Allen with 20 were elected to the Boardman Park and Recreation board for three year terms. The third candidate was Joe Tatone, who received 19 votes.

Charles Acock was re-elected to the Boardman Rural Fire District board for a term of five years. He received 14 votes.

Lights Going Up

"Light Up Boardman for Christmas" is the slogan of the Boardman Tillicum Club, which is sponsoring the local lighting contest. In the past a few of the homes in town have been decorated for the holiday season, but this year the club hopes everyone will participate. Preliminary Plan Approved

The Boardman Planning Commission voted approval last week of the preliminary comprehensive plan for Boardman that was presented in a public hearing Nov. 17.

The plan has been developed by the firm of Cornell, Howland, Hayes, Merryfield and Hill. The proposal may be on the agenda of the January city council meeting.

In other action the commission approved the application of W. E. Nelson, contractor, to build a two story office building and the second half of 11 units of the apartments on north Main Street. The first 11 units have just been completed.

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WASHINGTON, D. C.—THE REVENUE ACT OF 1971 provides real benefits for car and truck buyers. Here are the provisions of the law with respect to motor vehicle excise taxes and what they mean to Ford Car and Truck Buyers:

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2. The 7% Excise Tax on passenger cars is repealed. This means reductions in the manufacturer's suggested list price of more than \$107 on Pintos (more on other series cars) and at least \$191 on Bronco Wagons, and \$183 on 8-passenger club wagons.

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
