

## Santa to Visit Irrigon Dec. 24

IRRIGON — Santa Claus is coming to Irrigon at 2 p.m. on Christmas Eve, Friday, Dec. 24, with an assist from the Irrigon Lions club. Boys and girls of the community are invited to gather at the Christmas tree on 14 Highway at 8th Street. This has become an annual event in Irrigon, when treats are given to the children.

A number of homes have been decorated with Christmas lights in keeping with the holiday season. Many residents have enjoyed the Christmas carols ringing out on the loud speaker from the Al Partlow home.

### City Council

The Irrigon City Council accepted the audit report for fiscal 1971, when they met Dec. 14. The audit report was prepared by Allen Langenwaller and presented to the Council in the November session.

Mayor Chester Wilson reported on a meeting which he attended at Heppner, during the previous week, conducted by the department of Emergency Planning, formerly Civil Defense. A local emergency plan for the community is required by legislative act to be coordinated with the overall plan for the County and State. A meeting is being scheduled Friday, Jan. 7, for the community to meet and discuss the local emergency plan.

A gravel pit on private property, under City control was discussed at length. Dumping of non garbage types of refuse has been permitted for the purpose of filling the mosquito producing pond with the City attempting to provide cover as materials are dumped. Recent dumping of a number of car bodies and placing refuse in areas requiring additional work to disperse has generated protests.

Signs placed at the site ban dumping of car bodies and fines will be imposed for violation. An open letter to the community sets forth the problem and calls for cooperation or complete closure of the area. A garbage collection service is provided for the community both in and out of town at little expense.

### WHAT'S COOKIN

This week Katie Van Schoiack gave us a favorite of her family, Sour Cream Fudge Cake.

#### Sift together:

2 cups flour  
1 tsp soda  
1 tsp salt  
1 1/2 cups sugar into large bowl.

#### Add:

1/3 cup shortening and one cup thick sour cream.

Beat for 2 minutes in electric mixer.

Add 3 squares melted-cooled unsweetened chocolate, 2 eggs, 1 tsp vanilla and 1/2 cup water.

Beat for two minutes. Turn batter into prepared pans. Bake 350 degrees, 2 nine inch layer pans 25-30 min. 13x9x2 pan 30 to 40 minutes.

#### Fudge Frosting

1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup milk (Katie prefers evaporated), 1 egg yolk, 1 sq. chocolate, 1/4 cup butter.

Beat egg yolk and milk with beater. Stir in sugar. Add chocolate and butter. Cook ingredients over medium heat until it just boils (bubbly) cool beat as for fudge candy.

## G.M. Scholarships Offered in County

General Motors recently announced the continuation of its Scholarship Plan for the fall of 1972, beginning the eighteenth year of the Plan. 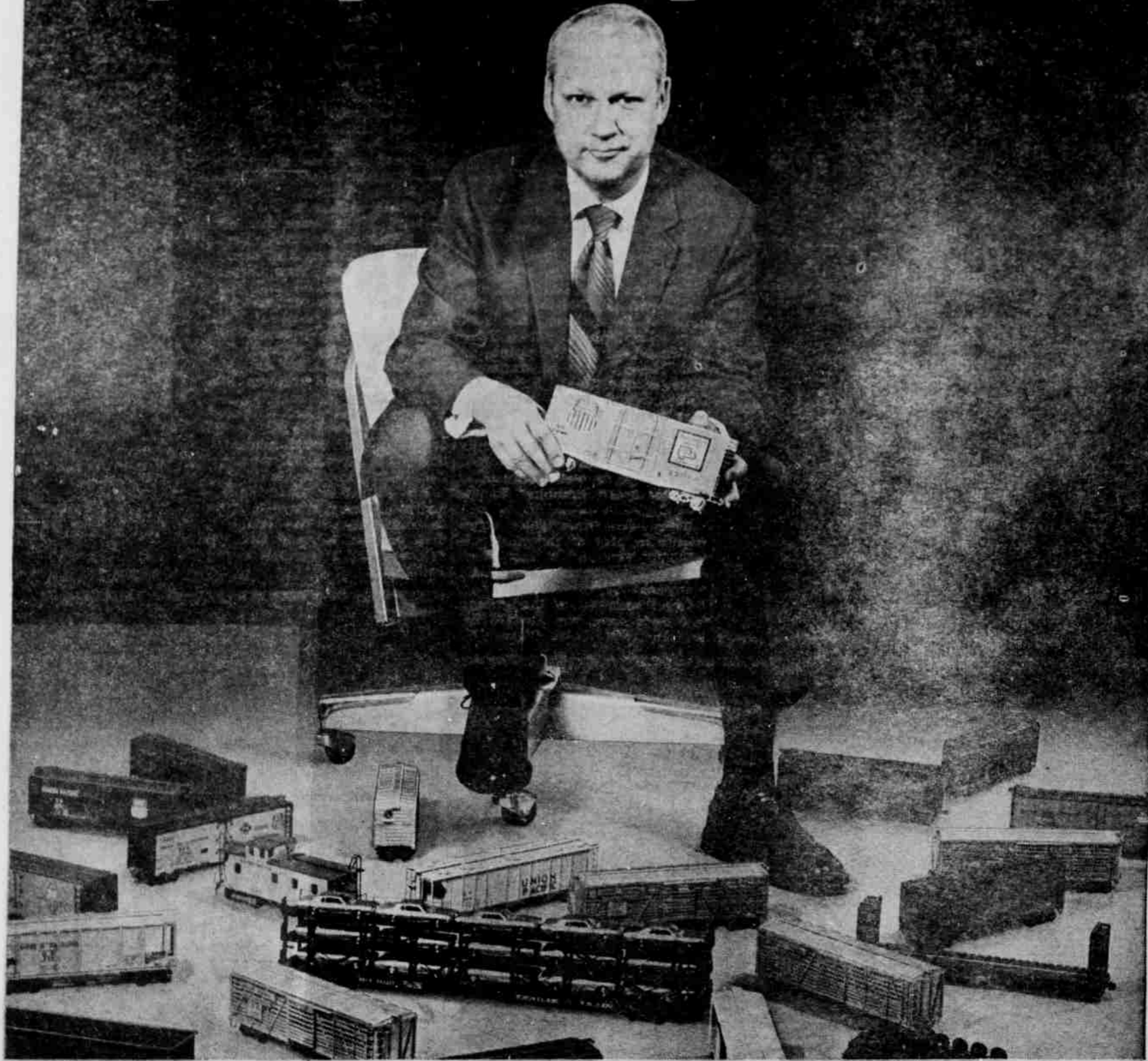
### The Busy Sewing Bees met at the home of Mrs. Bier.
