**Icebergs Nearly Delay Wedding**

Mrs. Schunk nearly missed her own wedding as there was 16 inches of snow in Heppner and the Columbia River was clogged with icebergs. She was employed as a cook on the Ward and McMinn sheep ranch at Six Prong, Wash., and had to cross the river to get home to her awaiting bridegroom. Weather conditions were so poor she didn't arrive until 12:00 p.m. on Christmas Eve.

After the couple were married, they moved to Oregon City for six years then returned to Heppner where they resided for 35 years.

Mr. Schunk served as Chief of Police for six years after returning to Heppner. He then drove truck for R. A. Thompson and they lived on one of his places.
