**Eleanor's Apple Cake**  
 3/4 cup butter or margarine  
 1 1/2 cups sugar  
 2 well beaten eggs  
 2 1/2 cups flour  
 1 1/2 tsp baking soda  
 1/2 tsp salt  
 3/4 cup cold strong coffee  
 1 tsp vanilla  
 3 cups chopped apple  
 Eleanor served it with a rum sauce but here's a topping if you'd rather. 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1 tsp cinnamon, 1/2 cup nuts. Sprinkle on top and bake 350 degrees for 35-45 minutes in a 9 x 13 loaf pan.

"Cactus and succulents are the easiest plants to propagate," Bill Rawlins told the Heppner Garden Club members Monday evening at their meeting held at the home of Mrs. Alice McCabe. There are many succulents besides cactus. Succulents are the type of plant that has developed the ability to store moisture within itself and do without moisture for a long period of time.

The Indians of the southwest have used the cactus fibers for making rope, the water for a fermented drink and the cactus leaves for salad.

Another interesting bit of information, Bill told how Luther Burbank had developed a prickly pear without spines that is now raised commercially for stock.

Crushed egg shells are an excellent medium for planting cactus and other succulents. They should all have a resting period without water.

The next meeting on Feb. 14 will be held at the home of Rev. and Mrs. Rudy Mensch. Mrs. Fredrick Martin of Ione will give the program on "Chrysanthemum Culture". She will show slides.

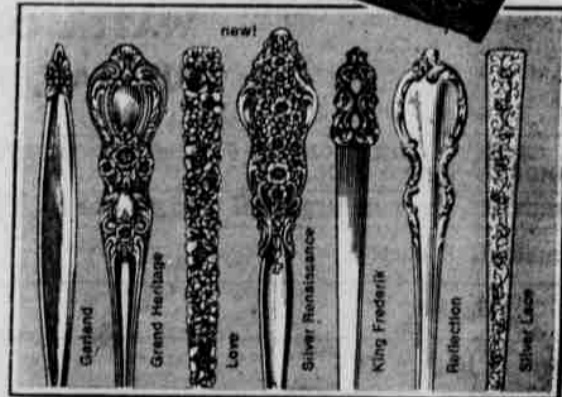

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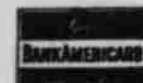
