The next game will be with Riverside at Ione on Jan. 13 at 2 p.m.

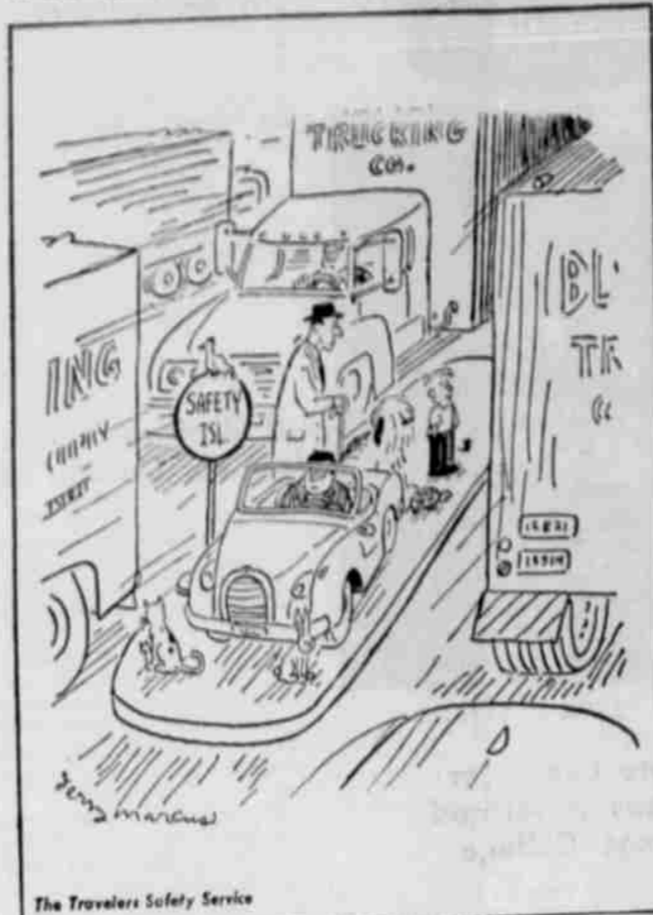
