

Irrigon Plans For Emergencies

IRRIGON — An emergency planning meeting was held in Irrigon at the A. C. Houghton School, Jan. 3. This is part of a County Wide plan of preparation and forethought in case of any type of disaster. Irrigon is not faced with a flood threat such as Heppner experienced but was threatened with a grass fire several years ago.

M. L. Walker of Salem, who is P.N.B. 911 area field coordinator and J. L. Morrison of Portland, Commercial consultant, attended the meeting. Walker spoke to the group stating that the 911 program began in 1968, when it was recognized that many people didn't know where to call in an emergency, such as fire, need of an ambulance or police service. The telephone company came up with a simple easy to remember number 911, which could be used for any emergency. It will be a priority call which will be taken by an operator at an emergency center who will be able to sound the fire siren from her position before taking information as to where the fire or need of help may be Toledo, Wash., was the first community to install the system, which has now spread to many areas. Canada has a similar program, Walker stated. Since Hermiston is installing the emergency system Irrigon residents will be able to use the 911 number to call for police protection, ambulance service but at present should use local numbers in case of fire. These are Lee's Texaco, 922-3384 days, Don Adams, 922-3356 at night. Don Adams stated that new stickers with fire numbers will be out soon.

Mayor Chester Wilson said that although the community is limited in population, emergencies can be met if preparation is made and we are all involved. Committees appointed by Mayor Wilson included Search and Rescue, to the Rural Fire Dept., headed by Don Adams, with back-up including Jack Gayman and Burrell Cooly. Law and Traffic, and the Police Dept., is headed by Perry Pummel. Under utilities Gayle Shoemaker and Richard Ryan were named, along with UECA and PNW Bell. Warren McCoy was named in charge of City equipment. Frances McCoy was asked to head up Human Relations, assisted by local communications. Samie Griffin, Housing and welfare was assigned to Irrigon Lions Club under the direction of Duane Kerlin. Transportation especially of the elderly would come under human relations committee. The Umatilla Hospital was named for First Aid, and local ministers for spiritual guidance. Principal Mick Tolgar would automatically be in charge of school involvement.

Planning for Zoning
The Irrigon Planning Commission will meet Thursday, Jan. 13, at 7:30 in the upstairs Council room in the old school building, to discuss land use, zoning and the formulation of a zoning ordinance.
