**Bookworms Hear of Pioneer Life of 1780**

Inez Erwin reviewed "The Land Breakers" by John Ehle for the Bookworm Club at its Jan. 14 meeting in the home of Mrs. Gene Ferguson. Twelve members enjoyed the look back almost two hundred years into life in the wilderness mountain country of North Carolina.

The author, John Ehle, has written many documentary plays and films, and has published three novels, "Move Over, Mountain", "Kingstree Island", and "Lion on the Hearth", and two books of nonfiction, "The Survivor" and "Shepherd of the Streets".

"The Land Breakers" main character is Mooney Wright, the first man to open a mountain valley. He was a big man, strong, eager to accept the challenges and to pit himself against seen and unseen threats, wolves and bears and snakes, terrifying nighttime forest noises, bone-biting cold, and the very lonely quiet edged with fear.

His first year he uses his strength and spirit to chop down trees, build a cabin against the coming Winter's mountain storms, burn off the brush,

scratch some planting room for crops, and do a little planting. As the years pass, more settlers come into the valley, Morrey decides to marry, many problems beset him.

One of the high points concern a unsuccessful stock drive from the mountain valley down to Morganton. Everything goes wrong, and the settlers suffer a great loss.

Mooney's wife, Lorry, is a fine example of a pioneer woman. Her struggles and failures and successes are very interesting. The characters in the few families of the valley are well-drawn and present a good picture of early American life.

Readers who enjoy historical fiction will find "The Land Breakers" exciting, enjoyable, and educational.
