QUESTION:

An out of state air carrier is contemplating storing surplus aircraft in Oregon during slack periods. The aircraft will be brought into Oregon for storage purposes only. The air carrier does not now operate in Oregon nor will it use these aircraft to carry goods or passengers into or out of the state. The aircraft are certificated by the Civil Aeronautics Board for scheduled air service. Would these aircraft be subject to Oregon taxes if they are brought into the state after Jan. 1?

ANSWER:

Since the aircraft in question are certified for scheduled air service they would be taxable as personal property under ORS 308.105 but only if the aircraft have a situs in this state on Jan. 1 of the assessment year.

Irrigon Hosts 4-H Leaders

IRRIGON - North Morrow County 4-H Leaders Council met with Extension Agents Harold Kerr and Don Stangel and with Birdine Tullis of Heppner, at the home of Marge Shade on Wednesday.

President Francine Evans stated that the 4-H poster contest was on and 4-H members should have them completed and turned in to Gladys Hobbs by Feb. 11. Posters will be judged in Irrigon by 3 teachers, Mrs. Hobbs, Joyce Smith and Rose Hoosier. First and second prizes will be given to both grade school and Jr. High and High School 4-H members. Winning posters will go to Heppner to compete at the County level. Winners will be eligible to compete in State and National contests. Five posters will be selected from Morrow County. The Community 4-H Club and the Leaders 4-H Club will each donate \$10 toward prizes.

Oregon 4-H Leaders Conference is scheduled for Jan. 19-20-21, at Corvallis. Local leaders who plan to attend are Mrs. Orville Buchanan and Mrs. Chester Wilson.

Don Stangel stated that applications are due for National awards and scholarships, to older 4-H members. Leaders were reminded to send in orders for 4-H pins, to be given out at the beginning of the year rather than at the end of year.

Umatilla and Morrow County Extension agents are making plans to cooperate in 4-H camps this summer. Tents are needed in both large and small sizes.

A 4-H leaders banquet is planned for Feb. 17 at the Ione school. It is sponsored by the Columbia Basin Electric, with the Empire Builders 4-H club doing the planning and serving.

Zoning Ordinance Reviewed

The proposed zoning ordinance for the City of Irrigon was thoroughly reviewed and some sections re-edited in a lengthy planning Commission and City Council session Thursday. The ordinance follows zoning proposals for the County Ordinance in most respects, co-ordinating with the proposed Morrow County Comprehensive plan for the Irrigon area.

Two zone categories contained in the County ordinance were deleted as not applicable to the City's plan. These were exclusive farm and flood hazard zones, which were eliminated.

Discussion on Mobile Homes

A lengthy discussion took place on locations of mobile homes within the City. Under the proposal they will be permitted in all but industrial zones with limitation on size and compliance with City trailer Ordinance provisions. Zone boundaries are scheduled to be set in a continuing meeting Thursday, Jan. 20 at 7 p.m. Basically the plan calls for low density residential north of

the highway to 1st St. Farm Residential between 1st and 2nd. Farm Residential and Farm. South of the highway except for a Commercial strip along the highway from 1st St. to East of 13th. There is a Commercial area also North of the highway which is planned for a future shopping center area.

Hearings on Zoning

Hearings will be held on the completed zoning ordinance before it is formally adopted by the Council.

Copies and maps of the proposed zoning ordinance, as well as that of the County are available for inspection at the homes of Mayor Chester Wilson and Recorder Ruth Coy, at Lee's Texaco Station and the Complete Food Store.
