The object of the exercise was to see if all the implications or the incident dramatized were correctly presented. These playlets were the basis for the discussion topic of how easy it has been and still is for artists, preachers, writers of church school material, and the ordinary person to pervert and distort the message of the Bible by overlooking salient points or adding biased material. A number of examples from painting and literature were drawn upon to show how contemporary men, unwittingly, read their own culture back into that of Bible times.

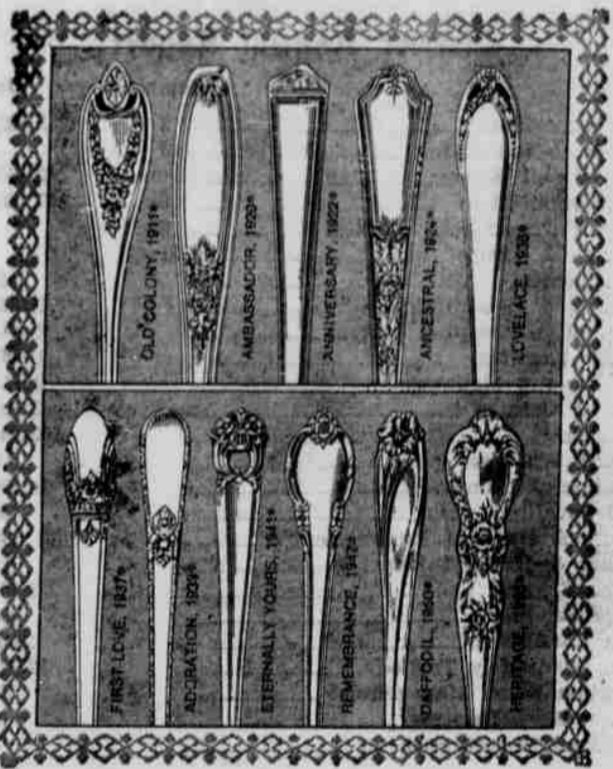
