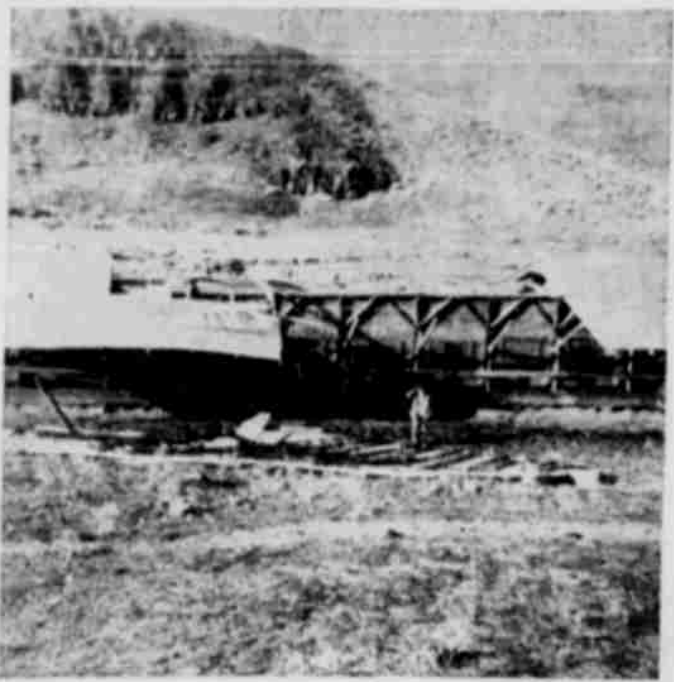
There will be a Junior High School Dance in the Cafeteria Friday night from 7-11 p.m.
