College Gives Teachers Raise

The Blue Mountain Community College board of education last night approved a cost-of-living pay increase of \$220 for each faculty member for the 1972-73 school year.

Russell Dorrain, Hermiston, chairman of the board, congratulated the six-member negotiating committee for presenting a salary package well within the suggested federal wage guidelines. With the approval of the salary increase, he said he hoped the college could build a budget requiring a levy that would not exceed six percent of this year's figure.

Bob Abrams, Heppner, Chairman of the board negotiating committee, said the board will continue to recognize teaching excellence and that the evaluation of teachers will continue to be a part of the BMCC salary picture.

New Phone Books Soon

New Heppner, Ione and Lexington telephone directories are scheduled for delivery beginning Feb. 8, reports Pacific Northwest Bell manager Dale Slusher.

Approximately 1,700 books will be delivered initially, Slusher says. A total of 2,414 directories have been printed.

Umatilla Electric Adds New Lines

The Umatilla Electric Cooperative Assn., is borrowing money from the Rural Electrification Administration, which, along with other construction projects, provides for the construction of approximately three miles of 115 KV transmission line. The transmission line will be located in an area four miles east of Boardman in Morrow County. This transmission line is for the connecting a new 20,000 kilowatt substation with a new substation being constructed by the Bonneville Power Administration in the area. These facilities will make it possible for the cooperative to provide for the increasing irrigation developments along with the increasing power demands of present consumers. The overhead structures will be made as compatible as possible with the local surroundings using a post type insulator construction. It is felt the improved service capabilities and reliability will far outweigh most of the unfavorable environmental considerations, if any. If there are any comments on the environmental aspects of the proposed structure, they should be submitted to the cooperative within thirty days of the publication of this notice. Additional information may be obtained at the cooperative's office at 2135 N. 1st Street, Hermiston. A map showing the proposed route is also available for all.

Tax Tips for 4-H'ers

Under present laws and regulations, 4-H members must submit State and Federal Income Tax reports if their 4-H (self-employment) income, less expenses, exceeds \$400.00, or their total income exceeds \$1700.00.

Leaders who itemize deductions may include among contributions the cost of gasoline or mileage, and other out-of-pocket expenses connected with 4-H leadership, including attending training and 4-H conferences. They may not, however, claim deductions for time or work contributed.

Forms with explanations may be obtained from post offices, banks, state or federal tax offices, accountants, and other places.

Taxes provide the revenue needed for costs of public services and facilities. 4-H'ers learn to be responsible citizens early as they file income tax returns!

Pasture Workshop Is Next Tuesday

An Irrigated Pasture Workshop will be held next Tuesday, Feb. 8, 1972, starting at 9:30 a.m. at the Greenfield Grange Hall in Boardman, reports Harold Kerr, County Extension Agent.

The program will be led by four Extension Specialists from Oregon State University. Dr. Harold Youngberg will discuss pasture establishment techniques, adapted varieties and fertilizer recommendations.

Dr. Jim Vomocil will cover irrigation scheduling and water management.

Dr. John Landers will talk on livestock utilization of the forage.

Dr. Gene Nelson will discuss the economic possibilities of irrigated pasture, i.e., expected returns and estimated costs from this enterprise.

The program leaders will use two examples . . . one a center-pivot system on sandy soils and a wheel roll system on the finer textured soils.

Arrangements for noon lunch will be up to the participants at the local restaurants. Coffee will be served at the meetings. The program will end about 3:30 p.m.
