The recipe we've all been watching for... The Wheat League Cake recipe for 1972 arrived in Friday's mail. Old timers say there was an apple sauce cake several years ago. I didn't have fun trying these until the two chocolate cakes in a row a few years ago, the party cake that took all day and then last year's chocolate cake again. I am OK at trying it but the recipe always calls for 9" cake pans and mine are only 8". This year I must remind Charlie to get me a set of 9 inchers for Valentine's Day.

Apple Sauce Cake

4 cups all purpose flour
4 tsp soda
1 1/4 tsp salt
2 tsp cinnamon
1/2 tsp nutmeg
1/2 tsp cloves
2 tablespoons Cocoa
Combine and beat well
1 cup vegetable oil
2 cups sugar
Stir in:
3 cups unsweetened applesauce (heated)

Add:
Dry ingredients and mix well
Stir in:
1/2 cup raisins
1/2 cup walnuts
Put batter in 3 nine-inch cake pans. Bake at 400 degrees for 15 minutes, then reduce temperature to 375 degrees and bake 15 minute more.

Brown Sugar Frosting

3/4 cup margarine—melted
1 1/4 cup brown sugar
1/4 tsp salt
Boil over medium heat for 2 minutes. Add 1/3 cup milk. Return to heat and bring to full boil. Remove from heat and cool slightly. Add: 3 cups powdered sugar. Mix well and frost cake.

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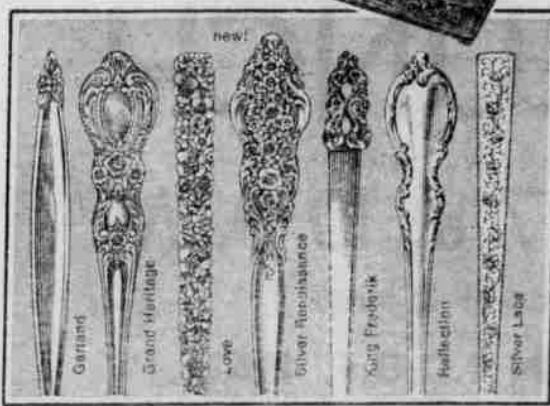
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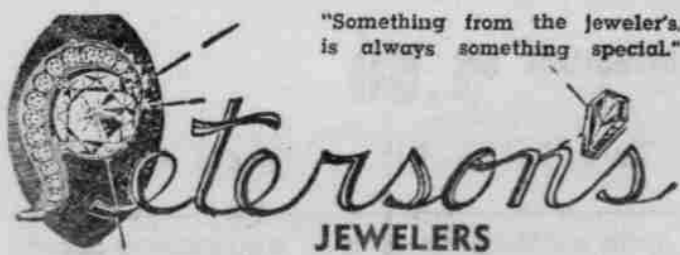
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
