

Bookworms Learn Of Future Shock

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A "Must" Book
Some readers and reviewers consider "Future Shock" somewhat of a sequel to Charles Reich's "The Greening of America". Both books have become "musts" for high school, university and adult students of the American scene.

The book contains extensive notes on each chapter and a lengthy bibliography. Its author, Alvin Toffler, has been an editor of "Fortune" and a Washington correspondent. He has written for many periodicals such as "Life", "Horizon", "Playboy" and the "Annals of the Academy of Political and Social Science". He is the author of "The Culture Consumers" and the editor of the prize-winning volume "The Schoolhouse in the City". He has taught at several great universities and served as advisor to many significant funds and organizations.

Describes Today's Changes
This book is about the present. It is about what is happening today to people and groups who are somewhat overwhelmed by change. Change affects our products, communities, organizations—even our patterns of friendship and love. Mr. Toffler vividly describes the emerging super-industrial world—tomorrow's family life, the rise of new businesses, subcultures, life-styles and human relationships—all of them temporary. He thinks things are high here in the United States and the one thing he missed was a good salad. They are hard to find over there.

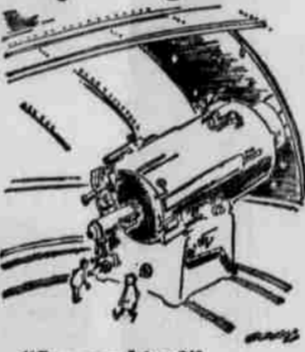
